will apply chiefly to the northern

parts of the country.

2. Suspension of new certificates

in many other areas to give

local boards a "breathing spell"

during which they can process

more carefully the applications on

file, and to give district offices

an opportunity to recalculate

monthly quotas.

3. A special staff of OPA in-

vestigators to undertake a "vig-

orous campaign" against the div-

ersion of home canning sugar into

bootleg liquor or illicit bottling.

The home canning sugar ration

has been reduced from a maxi-

mum of 25 pounds a person last

year to 15 pounds this year. In

addition, however, each local

board has been directed to keep

its 1945 allotments to within 70

per cent of last year's.

"This means that many boards

will have a maximum far below

the 15-pound individual limit.

French Fire in Syria

Halts, But Troops Remain

"ultimatum" in describing

Churchill's note asking Gen. De

Gaulle to halt French military

activity in Syria, but discussed

the situation in generally moder-

ate terms.

Other cautions Britain that

"appeasement" of the Arabs in

the case of Syria held dangerous

potentialities for Britain else-

where in the Middle East. Some

criticized De Gaulle for taking a

more aggressive attitude than

French strength justifies.

The French ministry of information

meanwhile said that the "incen-

dents in Syria and Lebanon have

been greatly exaggerated" and

reiterated the French position

that the unrest in the two

countries were artificially stimu-

lated.

French troops had been forced

to take action, it was said, by

the "acts committed by special

troops of Syria and Lebanon com-

manded by Syrian and Lebanese

officers.

The commentary closed with an

expression of hope that no new

incidents would arise.

Syria itself will not be invited

to the tripartite conference, the

British foreign office spokesman

disclosed, although it might be

invited to participate in later

U. S. Army to Be Doubled

For Task of Beating Japs

wehrmacht and the luftwaffe."

"It is our plan that every physi-

cally fit soldier in the United

States who has not yet served

overseas be assigned to foreign

duty when he completes his train-

ing, or if he is fulfilling an essen-

tial administrative or service job,

as soon as he can be replaced by

a returning veteran. This has

been the army's policy since the

beginning of the war. It will be

rigidly adhered to in the redeploy-

ment period."

More Japs Than Germans

He said the Japanese have more

than 4,000,000 troops under arms,

a force larger than the Germans

ever were able to put against the

allies on the western front.

To back up this, he added, they

have several million additional

men of military age not yet cal-

led.

"We have not yet come up

against the main strength of this

Japanese military force," he said.

"The Japanese army is organized

into 100 combat divisions. Its air

force, despite the heavy losses it

has suffered, still comprises over

3,000 combat planes."

At a news conference earlier to-

day, Mr. Truman expressed his

"very deep sympathy" for rela-

tives of American prisoners of

war held by the Japanese and

said he is doing everything possi-

ble to "bring about their release

as soon as possible."

He disclosed he had some ideas

on postwar universal military

training that don't agree with

those of the army or the navy

nor with those of some members

of congress. He said he is work-

ing with congressional groups on

the question but until a policy is

formulated he preferred not to
