MRS. S. L. KIDDER AND DAUGHTER-IN-LAW ARE HONORED AT CLUB AFFAIR.

Kidder, who recently returned to the States, following her liberation by Americans from the Santa Tomas Japanese prison camp in Manila, and her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Stanley Kidder, who was held a prisoner at Los Banos camp in the Philippines, were special guests of honor at the annual May-day party of the Business and Professional Women's club Monday night at the clubhouse. Mrs. Kidder is a charter member of the club.

The clubhouse was attractively decorated with numerous baskets of iris.

A short business meeting was held and the club responded to an appeal made by Mrs. Randolph Flagg to participate in the 7th War Bond drive and it was voted to appoint a committee to assign districts to the members to sell the war bonds.

Group singing was led by Ina Farnsworth, accompanied by Frances Lintott.

Mrs. Kidder was introduced and gave an intensely interesting account of her experiences while a prisoner of war and of the marvelous devotion given them by the Elks lodge when they arrived at Los Angeles. Her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Stanley (Lacia) Kidder also gave an account of the rescue of prisoners from Los Banos, where she and her husband were held prisoners for 38 months.
