Germany's Boundaries Rolled Back by Allies

defined in the statement.
Nazis Fully Disarmed
Details of the unconditional
surrender were announced simultaneously.

In addition to trimming Germany down to pre-1918 size, she is disarmed, her ships and communications made forfeit to allied control, her planes grounded, and her war factories placed at allied disposal.

Cession of the four-power control council in matters affecting Germany as a whole was provided for as follows:

"In the period when Germany is carrying out the basic requirements of unconditional surrender, supreme authority in Germany will be exercised, on instructions from their governments, by the Soviet, British, United States and French commanders-in-chief, each in his own zone of occupation, and also jointly, in matters affecting Germany as a whole. The four commanders-in-chief will together constitute the control council. Each commander-in-chief will be assisted by a political adviser."

"The control council, whose decisions shall be unanimous, will ensure appropriate uniformity of action by the commanders-in-chief in their respective zones of occupation and will reach agreed decisions on the chief questions affecting Germany as a whole."

Control to be Sweeping
German labor in plants and records or other useful information are to be furnished to the allies upon demand.

All German facilities for moving allied troops, together with their equipment and supplies are to be furnished upon allied demand.

The Germans were ordered to provide complete and detailed information about mines, mine fields and other hazards, and to make available unarmed German military and civilian personnel to render these areas harmless.

German radio were ordered silent unless directed to continue by allied representatives.

Principal Nazi leaders and others designated by allied representatives as being suspected of war crimes are to be apprehended and surrendered. The same applies to united nations traitors in Germany, and German authorities and people were ordered to comply with any instructions given by the allied representatives for the apprehension and surrender of such persons."

No Decision on Austria
No announcement was made regarding a joint control arrangement for Austria, which is expected to be set up in the fairly near future. Treatment of Austria presumably will be temporary by the Moscow declaration of 1943, which looked toward a restoration of Austrian freedom, depending upon Austrian efforts in behalf of their own liberation.

Nor was there any clarification of what is to be done in Czechoslovakia which is partly occupied by Russian troops on the east and American troops in the west.

Prompt action on the legislation is necessary, Taylor told the committee, so equipment, housing and supplies now available can be allocated for training purposes.

Benefits Pointed Out
Taylor listed as "benefits" he said would accrue to a youth taking the training:

"Ability to protect himself in an emergency, self-reliance, promptness, ability to accept and give leadership, physical fitness, respect for authority, a keen sense of responsibility to community, state and nation."

No longer, Taylor declared, can America "expect to prepare for war while heroic allies keep the enemy at bay. If any other war breaks, America will not be given the chance to become again the arsenal of democracy."

To again permit our country to become unprepared, to allow our army to be reduced to a mere police force; to be lulled into a false security by wishful thinking will mean the death of our sons and grandsons."

Optimism Ebbing
While announcement of state department backing at yesterday's opening session encouraged such advocates of peacetime conscription as representative Wadsworth (R-NY), it failed to raise the spirits of other proponents.

Wadsworth, told reporters he was optimistic over the outlook and believed the house ultimately would order a peacetime draft as an alternative to a large professional army.

Wadsworth's optimism wasn't shared by several other members of the committee, headed by representative Woodrum (D-VA). "We lost our fight when Germany surrendered," one of them said privately. "We have waited too long. The opposition is growing stronger every day."

VFW Offers Own Plan
A substitute for the American Legion-backed proposal was offered to congress today by the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The program calls for training in the national guard or naval and marine reserve units for a three-year period.

Under the VFW proposal, as explained to the house postwar military policy committee by Omar K. Ketchum, national legislative representative, compulsory military training would be given in a boys own community without disturbing his home life or his education.

The trainee automatically would become a member of the national guard or a naval or marine reserve unit at a predetermined age, would participate in weekly drills and training periods at his local armory, and take two weeks training every summer at a reserve camp.

Ketchum said the VFW would insist on a specific ban against use of trainees in civil emergencies, such as strikes.

He made it plain, too, that his organization would not oppose a straightaway one-year training program if the VFW plan is not accepted, adding that the alternate proposal was advanced to "quiet the fears of those opponents."

New Roseburg Budget Receives Tentative O. K.

formed of their work and revenue of the office.

"It is our understanding that a complete police docket is not maintained for all offenses, and we believe this should be done and all fines accounted for to the city treasurer."

"We would suggest that some special revenue be provided for funds for the recreation program in future years when federal funds are not available, and we believe a general business license by the city is one means to this end."

Salary Changes Made
The tentative budget makes few changes in salaries. It would make allowance for an added member of the police force to serve as a traffic officer at \$1,920 per year and would add \$300 to the police budget for special services. An assistant fire chief is authorized at a salary of \$1,920 per year. The street superintendent was given a salary increase of \$125 per year, a total of \$2,225, and a similar amount was specified for the superintendent of the sewage disposal plant. An assistant street superintendent at \$2,040 per year was approved.

The budget contains an item of \$1,750 appropriated for several consecutive years for the swimming pool sinking fund. The sum of \$5,000 was proposed for the recreation fund to which the federal government is expected to add \$10,000. An addition of \$600, for a total of \$3,600, was approved for the public library. The usual band allowance of \$720 was authorized.

Rest Rooms Favored
Principal item in connection with municipal contributions was appropriation of \$3,500 for construction of public rest rooms to be built on the park opposite the Elks lodge temple. The committee also recommended \$3,000 for construction of a machinery shed for the street department. Amounts of \$600 each were included for building, plumbing and electrical

inspection with the expectation that this work, now conducted by the fire chief, street superintendent and chief of police, who collect and retain fees for the services performed, would be incorporated and placed in charge of one man.
