Body Found in Berlin Identified as Hitler's

nouncement of the discovery has been made yet by Moscow, this Russian source said that as long as any element of uncertainty exists the Russians do not wish to state definitely that Hitler's body has been found. The source added, however, that there seemed little doubt that this actually is the corpse of Hitler.

Poisoning Indicated
Examination of the body showed that the man almost certainly died of poisoning. Whether this was self-administered there is no sure means of knowing. It will be recalled, however, that Russian sources recently reported that Hitler died of an infection given him by his physician, Doctor Morel, after he had been insane and half paralyzed for several days. According to a telegram sent by Propaganda Minister Goebbels to Grand-Admiral Karl Doenitz, Hitler died at 3:30 p. m. on May 1. Goebbels himself apparently committed suicide shortly afterward, just before the last stronghold of Nazidom, in Berlin fell to the Russians.

Goebbels Decapitated
Goebbels' own body was discovered by the Russians in the same underground shelter, together with those of his wife and children. All had died by poisoning. Goebbels apparently had administered poison to the members of his family and then committed suicide himself. His body was found practically decapitated by a shell splinter of explosive charge which had caught him full in the neck, almost tearing his head from his body.

The bodies of Goebbels and his family also were badly burned, but were identified by the Russians without too much difficulty. The Russians have given no hint as to how the bodies of Hitler, Goebbels and other Nazis found in Berlin have been disposed of. This probably will remain a secret for all time to guard against the possibility of Nazi fanatics trying to recover the bodies.

Japs Going Underground To Dodge B-29 Assaults

Anti-aircraft fire was termed "hot" and fighter planes attacked viciously. Eight Superfortresses were lost. At least one of these was rammed over Kobe.

Pilots reported that Japanese fliers strafed crewmen parachuting from one crippled Superfort. Kuriles Again Bombed
Army and navy bombers from the Aleutians Monday attacked the Japanese Katakao naval base at Shimushu Jima in the Kurile islands, bombing by instrument through heavy overcast with unobserved results.

Anti-aircraft fire was meager and inaccurate and a flight of enemy fighters sighted by the Liberators did not attack. Thirty miles south of Katakao, Eleventh airforce Mitchells bombed installations at Masugawa on the east coast of Paramashiru. They made numerous direct hits, leaving several buildings burning.

All planes returned safely. Japanese forces on Mindanao thrown back, from all useful areas of the island, may have to make their last stand in the mountains east of the Sayre highway and west of Davao.

The harassed Japanese have been hurled from their prepared positions and are being given the "squeeze play" by two veteran divisions—the 24th commanded by Maj. Gen. Woodruff and the 31st commanded by Maj. Gen. Martin.

In northeastern Luzon, another hot Philippines battleground, Maj. Gen. Beightler's Buckeye (37th) division is crisscrossing toward Bayombong after capturing the key road junction town of Arto in the Cagayan valley.

U. S. Invasion of Japan Imminent, Tokyo Warns

warfare now being prepared by the Japanese is so different from anything used in Europe. It will mark a new epoch in military history, Tokyo said. The powerful Tokyo newspaper Yomiuri Hochi said developments on Okinawa and "the recently intensified enemy air raids on Japanese cities" was "unquestionably significant of a direct invasion attempt against the Japanese homeland."

White Nation Warned
"It is high time the entire nation burned its bridges and made

the fullest preparations for this imminent development, whose outcome will decide the rise or fall of our country for centuries to come," said a broadcast version of Yomiuri's editorial.

Doenitz acknowledged the Japanese were meeting "numerically superior" American forces on Okinawa and reported the landing of marines on Oroku peninsula, below Naha, which Admiral Nimitz disclosed yesterday. The landing force was reported by the Japanese to include 100 tanks and 400 to 500 infantry reinforcements.

Doenitz also claimed "at least one transport" was sunk and another warship of unidentified category "severely crippled with direct torpedo hits" as Nipponese torpedo bombers attacked United States warships near the islands of Miyako, Kume, and Tonaki. Miyako is south of Okinawa, while Kume and Tonaki are due west in the Ryukyu group.

"Our airmen in the course of this operation are believed to have scored many other results that remained unconfirmed due to extremely poor visibility," Doenitz said.

Blockade Tightened
Nimitz told of American bomber strikes, part of the tightening blockade on Japanese shipping. Privateers of fleet air wing One exploded a large oiler, sank three cargo ships and damaged a small freighter in vital waters between Asia and Japan.

Aerial harassment of shipping in these lanes has forced the Japanese to use a longer route north through Manchuria to supply forces on the mainland. Only in darkness and poor weather do the Japanese now send traffic between Korea and Japan.

In other strikes, fleet air wing 18 sank three small cargo ships and damaged three others south of Honshu, the main Japanese island, yesterday.

Okinawa Job Nearly Done
On rain-swept Okinawa the last reports of American progress put the Yanks on half of Naha air-drome, biggest in the Ryukyu chain. To the east, they were pushing relentlessly toward the southern tip of the island. Only 1/13th of Okinawa remained in enemy hands.

An official "well done" to the U. S. tenth army from Admiral Nimitz yesterday indicated full conquest might be completed shortly.

One marine and two infantry divisions meantime moved to cut the remaining 20,000 or so Japanese troops into small pockets. These Nipponese, remainder of a garrison which once numbered about 85,000 were marked for annihilation.

obligation to buy the food at promised minimum prices even though military needs turned out to be smaller than estimated.

Surpluses Moot Point.
This year's lower level of pork, egg, poultry and lamb production largely reflect WFA policies based on earlier expectations of victory in Europe last winter and a possible slackening food demand this year. WFA officials obviously were concerned with the prospect of having to deal alone with surpluses accumulated for war needs.

Undoubtedly, Anderson wants nothing like that to stand in the way of next year's production. Meanwhile government action designed to halt the killing for meat of egg-laying hens may be taken soon at Anderson's suggestion. He expressed deep concern over dwindling supplies and lower production of eggs at yesterday's hearing.

His committee was told by industry representatives that black market operators are offering poultrymen such high prices for hens that growers are selling rather than hold them for egg production at current ceiling prices.

was solely responsible for the slaughter.

Seized During Services
A Japanese force of 500 left the township of Libacao in Capiz province Dec. 18, 1943. On the way to Iloilo, Lt. Robert King of the U. S. army and two unidentified engineers, later to be numbered among those beheaded, were seized.

A Filipino, threatened with death, disclosed the location of an American mission hideout in the "Valley of Hope."

During Sunday services, 250 Japanese soldiers surrounded the camp. Watanabe and a picked group of his men seized the 16 Americans.

Victims Are Listed
They were: Dr. Frances H. Rose, field representative of the American Baptist Foreign Missionary society and professor of zoology at Central Philippine college; his wife, a professor of mathematics and foreign languages; James H. Covell, English professor; his wife, Miss Dorothy Dowell, principal of the Baptist missionary training school at the college.

Miss Signe Erickson, professor of religious education at the missionary training school; Dr. Frederick Meyers, director of Immanuel hospital at Capiz; Mrs. Meyers; Jane Addams, head nurse; the Rev. Erle Rounds, director of rural education for the convention of Baptist churches on Panay; his wife and eight-year-old son, Douglas; Mark W. Clardy, U. S. army engineer of Arizona; his wife and their two sons, Johnny and Terry.

The following afternoon, the 16 were led forth to due. Mrs. Covell was first.

Grave Not Marked
The heads of the three children still were attached to the bodies when Enano probed the ruins after the Japanese departed.

Engracio C. Alora, general secretary of the convention of Philippine Baptist churches, buried the bones in a common grave at the foot of the pulpit in the mission, but fortune did not mark the grave. Later the Japanese came back to the mission, chopped the communion table into fire wood and cooked a meal over the grave, unaware of it.

60,000 Deferred Men Facing War Induction

WASHINGTON June 6—(AP)—Sixty thousand currently "irreplaceable" industrial workers 25 through 29 stand to lose their draft deferments by fall, government officials estimated today.

Munitions cutbacks and diminished urgency of other war supporting activities will reduce by at least 17 per cent the total of 350,000 key men of that age now occupationally deferred, said these officials.

A preliminary manpower survey is being made by the government's inter-agency deferment committee in line with selective service's new policy of meeting calls from the ranks of men under 30.

Local Budget Law Is Argued in High Court

SALEM, Ore., June 6—(AP)—The state supreme court heard arguments today on a suit brought by Oregon Business and Tax Research, Inc., to invalidate the 1945 local budget law.

The firm, which seeks to re-

strain Secretary of State Far-
rall from including the law in the
published 1945 session laws, is ap-
pealing from a ruling by Circuit
Judge Duncan of Marion county,
who declared the law valid.

The firm contends the law is
invalid because amendments pass-
ed by the legislature were not in-
cluded in the final draft of the
law. Judge Duncan, however, ruled
that the law is valid because the
senate and house journals
show it was passed properly.

PGE Gets Re-Financing Permit; Securities Cut

SALEM, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—
Public Utilities Commissioner
Flagg signed today an order ap-
proving the re-financing plan of
the Portland General Electric
company, but reducing the
amount of securities to be issued
by \$1,500,000.

The company now has out-
standing bonds totaling \$39,565,-

000, bearing 4 1/2 per cent interest.
Under the plan before the fed-
eral securities and exchange com-
mission the new issue was to have
been \$34,000,000 in bonds and
\$5,500,000 in serial notes.

Flagg's order limits the serial
notes to \$4,000,000, the reduction
to be made by using present cash
balances.

The order limits the interest
rate on the bonds to 3 1/2 per cent,
but Flagg said the rate might be
as low as 3 per cent.

governed and live under some
authority" and as a whole "don't
like to mangle in politics." How-
ever, he said the Germans had

suffered badly and found them-
selves victims of nazism like
others, which might make them
"a little more cautious." It re-
mained possible, he added, that
they were "incapable of living
under a democracy."

Niemoeller said his opposition
to Hitlerism was based on re-

ligious grounds and that he was
not primarily interested in poli-
tics.

Asked for his views on com-
munism, Niemoeller said he had
"great personal esteem" for many
communists.

"Maybe there is a sort of life
for Christians under communism,"
he added. "We shall have to wait
to see."

Residence Ruling on Divorce Seekers Issued

OREGON CITY, Ore., June 6.—
(AP)—Oregon citizens can estab-
lish residence in any county in
the state for the purpose of in-
stituting divorce suits, Circuit
Judge Latourette has ruled.

The rule was issued in denying
a Portland plaintiff's request to
invalidate his wife's divorce plea
because she left his Multnomah
county home two weeks prior to
filing suit in Clackamas courts.
