

### Professional Army For U. S. Urged By General Bradley

WEST POINT, N. Y., June 6.—(AP)—Gen. Omar N. Bradley urged yesterday that the United States retain a core of professional soldiers "about which we can mobilize a great citizen army" as a contribution toward enforcing world peace.

Addressing 853 graduates of the United States military academy—the largest class of any at West Point's 146th commencement—Bradley said a reserve force perhaps could be trained "through some form of military service."

Bradley told them that the men he left recently in Europe had spent months "living in rain and huddling in snow" to win the war against Germany. "Your first concern must be for your men," he said.

Speaking of returning veterans, the general said the "overwhelming" preponderance of these American men are returning more matured, greatly broadened, mentally sturdier and more imaginative than when they went away.

"Military service has not submerged the dignity of the individual. Instead he has been trained to apply initiative and imagination—the greatest pair of weapons he carried into battle."

### S. P. Sets Day to Honor 19,000 in U. S. War Service

In honor of the more than 19,000 Southern Pacific men and women who have entered the armed forces, the 92,000 home front employees of the railroad will observe their third annual "Southern Pacific War Service Day" June 14, it was announced today.

At noon and evening rallies held over the company's far-flung lines and agencies in the United States, speakers will pay tribute to the railroad's fighters throughout the world, with appeals for support of the Seventh War Loan, blood banks, and all other phases of the war effort.

Special homage will be paid the railroad's honored war dead, now numbering approximately 200. They represent every front and every service, their heroism recorded in the employees' monthly magazine and their memory preserved on the company's service flag.

Miniature service flags bearing the number "19,000" will be worn by the railroad employees as lapel tags to mark the day.

"We are proud of our associates in the armed forces," said President A. T. Mercier in a message to the company's men and women regarding the special tribute. "To bring them home, safely and soon, it is our job on the home front to keep the Victory Trains rolling and to give wholehearted support to all war activities."

### To Reopen Bakery At Myrtle Creek

Reopening of the Myrtle Creek bakery, closed for two and one-half years, is expected soon following sale of the plant to M. Sand, experienced baker from Aberdeen, Wash. M. McDougall, who, after 20 years in the bakery business at Myrtle Creek, locked the door of his establishment and walked out two join two sons in military service, announced the sale today. ### OPA Berry Price Policy Assailed

WASHINGTON, June 7.—(AP)—An OPA official described the OPA's fruit and berry price structure yesterday as being designed to continue the "historical pattern" of having the East take

care of the fresh market while the Northwest maintained heavy output of processed fruits.

The official was E. F. Phelps, Jr., price executive of OPA's fruit and vegetable branch, who made the statement in answer to a complaint by Michigan processors that price regulations are forcing them out of business.

F. L. Granger of Benton Harbor, secretary of the Michigan Frozen Foods Packers association, asserted ceiling prices on strawberries, red and black raspberries and dewberries discriminate against processors in the eastern territory and against growers in Oregon and Washington.

He said that in the eastern ter-

ritory strawberry processors may pay no more than 15 cents a pound while the ceiling for buyers for fresh use is 24 cents a pound. Similar differentials exist for dewberries and strawberries.

The result, he claimed, was to force all fresh fruit into immediate consumption and to reduce the volume of processed foods.

Future Harm Seen in Research Training Void

PORTLAND, June 6.—(AP)—The United States already may have lost the next war through failure to train 50,000 to 100,000 youths as research workers, Edward F. Flynn of St. Paul, Minn., co-president of Rotary Interna-

tional, said here.

Flynn declared what is taught in schools, colleges and laboratories in the next 10 years may be more important than a peace organization.

"Nations fight for raw materials and for more territory from which to obtain them," he said. "Research, rather than war, produces raw materials and creates new trade channels."

### Baking with FRESH PRODUCE

**GLAZED FRESH STRAWBERRY PIE**  
4 cups fresh strawberries 1/4 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. butter or margarine  
Baked pastry shell 2 to 3 drops red food coloring  
1 cup water  
3/4 cup sugar  
4 tbsps. cornstarch

Wash and hull strawberries. Fill baked 9-inch pastry shell with 3 cups whole berries. Crush remaining 1 cup berries; cook with water 5 minutes; strain. To make glaze: Combine sugar, cornstarch, and salt; add to strained juice; and cook 3 minutes, or until thick and clear, stirring constantly. Add butter or margarine and red coloring. Cool slightly. Pour glaze by spoonfuls over fruit, being careful to coat all thoroughly. Chill. Serve plain or garnish with whipped table cream or ice cream and whole berries. Makes 1 9-inch pie. Serves 6 to 8.

**PAN-FRIED CHERRIES**  
An excellent accompaniment to meat or poultry.  
2 tbsps. butter or margarine  
4 tbsps. brown sugar  
3 cups cherries

Melt butter or margarine in heavy frying pan; add cherries and sugar; cover; and cook slowly 15 minutes, or until cherries are tender. Serves 6. Note: May pit cherries before pan-frying.
