Public Asked Not To Molest Fawns Found in Woods

Douglas county residents were urged today by Fred L. Perry, state policeman assigned to game law enforcement, not to molest fawns found in the woods.

"Many persons finding a fawn crouching behind a log or in some more or less exposed spot believe it has been abandoned by the mother," Perry said. "No fawn should be picked up, however, unless there is absolute proof that the doe has been killed or seriously injured."

Perry pointed out that it is a violation of law to have a fawn in possession without first securing a permit from the game commission. Permits are not granted to persons desiring fawns for pets except in very unusual cases, the officer stated.

"Many persons finding a small fawn in the woods believe it would make a fine pet," Perry said. "But after the animal reaches maturity it becomes dangerous and difficult to care for and it is either freed from captivity or the game commission is asked to take charge of it. A deer raised in captivity becomes so tame that lacking normal wild instincts of protection, it is easy prey to predatory animals or hunters when freed."

"It is very seldom," he said, "that a fawn found in the woods has been abandoned. A doe, startled by the approach of persons or a vehicle, will usually place the fawn in the best hiding spot available and will run a short distance away. She expects to find the fawn in the same spot when she returns."

"A fawn's scent glands do not develop until about the time the spots begin to change, usually a long in August. This is nature's protection for the small animal. A dog may pass within a few feet of a fawn and will not scent it. If the fawn is not left in the same spot where it was placed by the doe, the mother may have some trouble in locating it."

False Ideas Corrected
Contrary to general belief, a doe will not abandon a fawn which has been touched by human hands, Perry said. But handling should be avoided if possible. A fawn's apparent helplessness, he asserted, is a part of its protective instinct, and should not lead people to believe that it is injured or starved. A fawn which will be limp and apparently helpless, if picked up, will bound away with agility and speed if startled, the officer said.

"Each year," Perry reported, "we get numerous reports of abandoned fawns and application to retain them as pets. We cannot grant such requests. People should understand that the fawns have not been abandoned and, therefore, should not be molested."

European War End Elates Americans On Italian Front

WITH THE FIFTEENTH AIR FORCE SERVICE COMMAND—Italy—"It's all over here!"

Excitement reached a high pitch when the 35th air service squadron, 60th air service group, somewhere in Italy received the news that they had been waiting for. Mechanics put aside their tools, clerks stopped their endless checking, supply men turned from their counting and cooks ran out of the mess hall to join the rejoicing.

Master Sergeant Edward M. Rioridan of Culver City, Calif., an air corps supply technician joined the others as the news spread like wildfire. Broad grins were on every face. Celebration was in the air, but all the men realized that this was not the end of the war. After the speeches, party and general festivities, they all buckled down to their next job—that of moving the air forces out of Italy and toward Japan.

M/Sgt. Rioridan is the husband of Mrs. Virginia L. Rioridan of Roseburg, Ore., and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank J. Rioridan of Culver City, Calif. He has been in the army since October, 1939, and overseas since September, 1942.

More Tires for Logging Trucks Predicted

Convicted Evangelist Ousted by Church Board

PORTLAND, Ore., June 8.—(AP)—Pointing to his conviction last February on a disorderly conduct charge involving morals, trustees and the board of We the People, Crystal Lake Gospel park, last night ousted the Rev. Jerry Owen as their president and evangelist.

Owen, who calls himself the "football evangelist," was accused by the board of violating the scriptural requirements under which he was to have held office for life.

An appeal now is pending from Owen's sentence—\$50 and 30 days in jail. At the trial police testified they had arrested him in a hotel room with a 21-year-old woman.

A Los Angeles waitress, Mrs. Jean Kelly Wheeler, last month filed a paternity suit against Owen, naming him the father of her 21-year-old son.

ment of Senate President McKellar (D-Tenn.) that "I'll have to think it over; you know I've always been against raising our own salaries." And that of Chairman Cannon (D-Mo.) of the house appropriations committee, who said he viewed the idea as inadvisable "now."

Mr. Truman went into the subject of congressional and other pay, at his news conference late yesterday, telling reporters:

1. That he would not veto the legislative appropriation bill carrying a new expense allowance of \$2,500 for each house member—a feature the senate refused to vote for itself.

2. That he thought, however, the lawmakers ought to come out for a straight-out salary increase to \$15,000 or \$25,000 and that he would sign such a bill.

3. That the "little steel" wage formula will stand, at least until a thorough investigation of present wage and commodity rates. This study will be undertaken later, Mr. Truman said. A few hours earlier AFL President Wil-

lam Green and CIO Chief Philip Murray had visited the White House to urge speedy relaxation of the formula which forbids basic wage hikes of more than 15 per cent above January, 1941, levels.

Morse Criticizes Boost

The chief executive's promised approval of the \$2,500 house expense item, which the chamber approved finally by a 206 to 152 roll call vote yesterday, drew sharp words from Senator Morse (R-Ore.), former member of the War Labor board.

"The president can not escape the fact," Morse told a reporter, "that the action taken by a \$2,500 subterfuge wage grab is in direct violation of the wage stabilization program of this government."

"I wonder if the president is ready to ask congress to increase the salaries and wages of every man, woman and child in this country by a corresponding amount. I for one believe that the same rules should apply to congress as to the rest of the people."

Morse said that sometime in the future, when conditions are stabilized, congress could give attention to increasing the pay and allowances of its members but that it should not do so before then.

Million Mark Passed by U. S. War Casualties

WASHINGTON, June 8.—(AP)—Army and navy combat casualties during the war reached 1,012,049 today, an increase of

9,162 in the past week. The army total of 895,834 represented names reported here through May 30 and reflected actual fighting through the early part of May—presumably up to about the time the war against Germany ended.

The navy casualties amounted to 116,215, a rise of 3,347 in the last week indicating the more intense fighting in the Pacific.
