Allow for Expansion of Syrup in Frozen Foods

Have you been troubled with breakage of glass jars of fruit in your frozen food locker? asks Miss Doris McWhorter, war food assistant for Douglas county.

A headspace is required in using a syrup pack on fruit in glass jars to allow for expansion of syrup on freezing. Oregon State college bulletin No. 623 on "Food Preservation by Freezing" recommends a 1-inch headspace for short pints, 1 inch for tall pints and 1 1/2 inches for quarts.

It has been found recently, however, that with the required headspace, breakage of glass jars still occurs when fruit is frozen by the "quick-freeze" method—that is when product is frozen solid in two to four hours. It is advantageous to the quality of the frozen food to "quick freeze" the product whenever this facility is available. Miss McWhorter suggests when "quick freezing" to use moisture proof, vapor proof paper cartons for the syrup pack to prevent breakage. The syrup pack in glass jars with the recommended headspace is very satisfactory when the fruit is frozen within 24 hours by the "sharp or slow freezing method."

Clingman, Leone Win Mat Bouts at Bond Sales Boost

A baldish veteran of the wrestling game but a newcomer to Roseburg addicts of the sport annexed top honors on the weekly bill at the armory Saturday night. He was Otis Clingman, who won Referee Elton Owen's decision after splitting two falls with Buck Davidson in the final match of a program that began with a battle royal, from which Antonio Leone and Ken Ackles emerged as semi-finalists and Tex Hager was eliminated.

Designed chiefly to promote the sale of war bonds, the affair turned in sales aggregating a total of \$2,000, purchased in part at the box office and part by means of "auctioning" the victors, with premiums in the form of cartons of cigarettes, donated by the Fullerton Candy company.

Angered at the referee's award of victory to his opponent, Davidson staged a slugfest in the ring with Owen, and this lasted until Clingman intervened and the cops had hastened forward to take a hand. Davidson took the first fall of the bout in 16:15 with a Boston crab hold and Clingman gained the second in 12:42 with a leg entanglement known to the game as a jackknife. Neither man scored a deciding fall in the remaining one minute and 42 seconds of the tilt, but Owen designated the victor on his judgment of superior showing by raising Clingman's hand as the necessary token.

Bidder Wins Ham

The verdict drew a roar of approval from the crowd of nearly 600, which didn't like Davidson's unorthodox tactics. One of Davidson's habits of yanking his opponent around by the hair was useless because of Clingman's bald pate, and all Buck got for his effort were jeers from the spectators. Owen was unable to obtain a turkey committed to the auction bidder who picked the winner in the final, but a substituted ham was awarded on the strength of Clingman's victory to W. W. Winters of Riverside drive.

In the semi-final battle, Leone's weight advantage of 20 pounds and proportionately greater endurance offset the faster work of Ackles, although the lighter man roughened up the burly Frenchman considerably for 25 minutes before he succumbed to a body slam and a neck twister. No fall was registered in the remaining 41 minutes, and this automatically gave Leone the decision.

Missing Bomber Seen Near Canadian Border

Vancouver, B. C., June 11 (AP)—A Liberator bomber missing 10 days with its 11 royal air force crewmen has been sighted in rugged mountain country five miles south of the international border and there are signs of life around the wreckage, western air command reported today.

Planes carrying parachute jumpers were dispatched immediately to the area.

Wage Schedules O. K. Needed by New Mills

PORTLAND, Ore., June 11—(AP)—The West Coast Lumber commission announced today that all new sawmill and logging companies must get War Labor Board approval of their wage schedules before starting operations.

The order, effective July 1, was in line with a WLB ruling. The commission's legal division will start enforcement action against firms who fail to obtain advance

approval of wage schedules, officials said.

Seattle swept a Sunday doubleheader at San Francisco. Sacramento bounced back into third place with a double victory over Oakland and the cellar-dwelling Hollywood Stars won twice from San Diego.

The Angels' 6-5 and 5-1 wins Sunday and 5-1 victory Saturday gave them a 4-3 series edge. Russell, Los Angeles' third baseman, came through with a two-run homer in each game yesterday, contributing to the downfall of Helser and Tiding, Beaver hurlers. Comellas, Angel newcomer, took the mound in the opener and chalked up his second victory since joining the club. Right-handed Osborn limited Portland to five hits in the nightcap.

Seattle, beaten 8-3 by San Francisco Saturday, came back to down the Seals 9-5 and 5-0 Sunday and gain two full games on the league leader. Johnson and Demoran teamed to hurl the Rainiers to victory in the initial tilt yesterday, while veteran Hal Turpin blanked the Seals in his second game.

Sacramento rapped the faltering Seals 11-8 and 9-8 yesterday after dropping a 4-2 encounter Saturday.

Federal Building Of Shacks to Cease Soon as Possible

WASHINGTON, June 11—(AP)—City planners can just forget all about those "paper thin shacks" that the government has built as emergency war housing throughout the country.

It was an old man from St. Paul, quoted in the Portland Oregonian, who availed that description to the buildings in Vanport, Ore., constructed to house workers at the Kaiser shipyards on the Columbia river, near Portland, Ore.

Portland, on the one side, and Vancouver, Wash., on the other, have been worrying some about the ultimate fate of the war-born town, with its 12,350 family dwellings and 10,000 dormitory units. And that concern is reflected all through the west where the government has had to provide thousands of homes for workers who swarmed into the new war industries.

But, so far as the emergency-type housing is concerned, there's no need to worry, says the National Housing administration. It's got to come down two years after the war unless Congress grants a stay.

"Whenever we can be sure that

There's no further need for this housing in any area—when the war manpower commission, the army and navy tell us we have a surplus in any spot, we have plenty of places to use it to advantage," said a NHA spokesman.

"We've built much of it in 'panel construction' so it can be moved easily. We've learned to 'panelize' some of the older houses so they can be moved. We've even saved some in two in order to transport them elsewhere. Every stick of housing is needed to save manpower, material and money."

"So," this spokesman said, "a city might just as well forget this type of housing. By the time there's enough vacant housing anywhere to talk about, we'll have moved it elsewhere."

Use of the land on which housing has been located is another matter. Portland would like to see the Vanport area utilized for industrial sites, for instance, and Vancouver would like to be designated agent for the property. It's Vancouver's idea that local agencies that understand market conditions can put the land to its best use.

The surplus property law is intended to take care of the real estate. Public agencies get first chance, then the former owner or tenant, then the public, with a preference for veterans.

Veto Voting Plan Last Issue at Peace Huddle

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11—(AP)—Fresh signs that the big powers can compromise even sharp differences in the interest of peaceful cooperation sent the united nations conference into the home stretch today with brightened hopes for the world future.

There remains the problem of winning small nation acceptance of the veto voting formula by

which the Big Five would retain control of the proposed 11-nation security council with its machinery designed to keep peace.

This is before a conference committee in which Foreign Minister Evatt of Australia is leading a fight for restricting the veto so that, while each of the big powers would still have to agree on use of force, peaceful measures to settle disputes could be taken even over some big power objections.

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
