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Check on Account Leads to Arrest Ex-Police Chief

AURORA, Ill., June 11.—(AP)—Police today told how Earl Heuvel, Klamath Falls ex-police chief, was traced to the remote Arkansas town where he was working quietly under an assumed name.

A desire for more money, police said, led to the exposure in Kensett, Ark., of a recently-arrived electrical worker who used the name of Henry Knappa and told friends he was hiding from "persecution."

Aurora's police chief, Fred Hess, said a bonafide \$1400 check drawn on Heuvel's Oregon account was the first clue to the hideout of the ex-police official who fled Klamath Falls after indictment on several morals charges.

The check had been cashed here. Hess checked with Aurora residents who had endorsed the check, and they told this story: They received the check from an acquaintance of theirs in Kensett, Ark. The Kensett resident explained that a friend, Earl Heuvel, had been forced to hide out in that town to escape unjust "persecution."

Not realizing a criminal charge was involved, they cashed the check as a favor to their friend. Police Chief Hess said that when Oregon authorities asked him to trace Heuvel, the endorsers told him the story. Arkansas officials then talked to Heuvel's friend in Kensett, and arrested Heuvel in the electrical shop where he was working. The names of both Heuvel's

friend and the Aurora check endorsers were withheld.

Western lines will also have a record freight load, Mercier said.

Arabs Tell France To Remove Troops From Levant States

CAIRO, June 11.—(AP)—The Council of the Arab league has informed France in blunt terms that the Arab states will meet force with force in the Levant, and has told the French to get their troops out of Syria and Lebanon immediately.

A communique of the council, which has been considering the Levantine crisis, announced last night that measures were being put into effect "to resist French aggression" and laid the blame for "assassination, destruction and other losses which occurred in both countries" directly on France, whose troops, it said, attacked Syria.

Meanwhile, the Syrian government was moving rapidly to liquidate all its relations with France. A Damascus dispatch last night said all French officials in the customs and wheat commission had been discharged; French magazines and newspapers were prohibited from entering the country; French courts were being dissolved, and goods looted during the fighting in Damascus were removed from French barracks and institutions.

The Arab league council's communique said other foreign troops probably would leave Syria and Lebanon, and that "The British have announced without hesitation their intention to withdraw their troops."

Second Charge Faced as He Awaits Trial on First
PORTLAND, June 9.—(AP)—A Tigard man freed under \$1,000 bail on an assault and battery charge last year was again in custody today, charged with assault with intent to rape, disorderly conduct, and assault and robbery.

Both cases were similar, police said, accusing Allen Anthony Peterson of entering the bedroom of a sleeping couple, ordering the husband to leave, then starting to disrobe. Peterson is now held under a combined \$9,000 bail.

At an October, 1944 hearing he pleaded innocent to the first charge, court records showed, but trial date still has not been set.
