Confederate Veterans' Ex-Chief, Claypool, Dies

ST. LOUIS, June 12—(AP)—Gen. John Milton Claypool, 93, twice national commander-in-chief of the United Confederate Veterans died yesterday of pneumonia.

During his tenure as national commander Claypool declined to lead confederate veterans at a joint reunion of the Blues and Grays on the 75th anniversary of the battle of Gettysburg until his men were allowed to wear their uniforms and display their flags.

Lindbergh in Germany On Secret Navy Mission

PARIS, June 12—(AP)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh came into Paris quietly from his work in Germany over the weekend for a brief visit, and commented that "It is certainly different from what it was 18 years ago" when he landed from his transatlantic flight.

"I have been stopped on the street only once," he said. "He is in Europe in a civilian capacity, and has been working in Germany on a secret U. S. navy technical mission."

Conviction of 24 Bund Members Is Set Aside

WASHINGTON, June 12—The supreme court Monday set aside the conviction of 24 New York German-American bundsmen on charges of conspiracy to counsel persons to evade the draft.

The court voted 5 to 4. The defendants, who were indicted in 1942, had been sentenced to five years imprisonment each.

Lesser Region of Germany Will be Ruled by America

Until V-E day a common American attitude seemed to be "let the Russians and Poles occupy Germany. They'll teach 'em what's what. We and the British are too nice." Now that the Russians are to occupy slightly more than half the country, and the British an overwhelming important share of the remainder, pride seems to have taken the saddle and fear is expressed because American ideals will rule a lesser area.

Apparently not much consideration is being given to the angle that he who occupies the least of Germany is likely to come out with the smallest headache. Nor to the geographical accidents which make the present occupation zones natural. Nor to the important share of responsibility America is carrying in Italy. Nor to the fact that all Europe, ally and enemy alike, looks toward America for help in rehabilitation, a burden not resting so heavily on the other victors.

The Poles, under the Russians, are annexing Silesia, Germany's great eastern industrial area. The lines have not been clarified, but Britain and France presumably will handle the great proportion of industry remaining in the west.

Americans Get "Easy" Zone—Americans occupy areas which as a whole are less devotedly Nazi and less militaristic than the Russian area. When Germany is willing to trade her militaristic tradition, her tradition of superiority, for better things than can be obtained under occupation; when she realizes that peace even with privations is better than aggrandizement at the expense of war, then the less warlike areas of the south are far more likely to provide her leadership.

Nobody is being taken in by the "innocent bystanders" of southern and western Germany. The people have convinced themselves in many ways besides their free election in 1932, when Adolf Hitler's Nazis won a 5,000,000 majority out of 19,000,000 votes. Junkers to be Erased

But it is from the more northerly areas that we receive reports of undying Nazism, of wires across the roads to decapitate jeep drivers, of propagandists still trying to spread disunion between the allies.

There is wide agreement that the junkers must be wiped out. One part of this program is to break up their estates, at which the Russians and Poles are experts. There is wide agreement that Germany must never in foreseeable time have the industry with which to conduct a war. The British and the French have many reasons for seeing to this. America believes strongly in education for peace. But such a program is like gardening—very difficult unless there is some

More Youngsters Needed This Year To Harvest Crops

More boys and girls will be needed to help harvest Oregon's crops this year than ever before, reports Russell M. Adams, assistant state farm labor supervisor in the Oregon State college extension service.

In organizing this year's visiting farm volunteers, the state farm labor office is emphasizing the need for boys and girls to stay on the job for longer periods as well as for an increase in numbers of workers.

Greater interest has been shown this year in use of groups or platoons of youngsters, under the supervision of adult leaders, Adams says. In a number of communities, these groups of around 25 or 40 youngsters are being organized for the first time, especially where increased acreages of strawberries will demand more pickers beginning about the second week in June. About a tenth of the 50,000 Oregon boys and girls who helped with the harvest last season were in these organized platoons, Adams estimates.

Public school officials are co-operating with county farm labor offices in recruiting youth for these farm jobs and are giving their pupils every encouragement to join platoons, go out independently in smaller groups or obtain their own jobs, according to Adams. In some cases school principals are cooperating with farm labor assistants in placing youngsters directly.

In general, growers are planning to provide better transportation for their young workers and more satisfactory working conditions on the farms than in past years. Adams also points out a tendency toward a few mothers or other adults joining in many of the youth platoons. These are in addition to the adult platoon leaders, who are considered as the key to the success of a good platoon.

Boys or girls interested in harvest work or adults who can serve as paid platoon leaders may enroll or get additional information from county farm labor offices.

Lt. Sidney Fredrickson In Roseburg on Leave

First Lieutenant Sidney Fredrickson, son of Mrs. C. E. Fredrickson, Roseburg, arrived in Roseburg Saturday night. He has been granted a 60-day leave after which he will report to Santa Barbara, Calif., for reassignment. Lieutenant Fredrickson, who entered military service Dec. 39, 1941, went overseas Sept. 26, 1942. He participated in the Normandy invasion, and was made a prisoner of war in the St. Lo engagement. He was released by the Russian advance into Germany in April of this year. He suffered shrapnel wounds at the time of his capture but has fully recovered.

Transient Motorist to Be Given Washington

William G. Lumsden, Seattle, arrested Sunday while driving an automobile reported by the state police to have been listed as stolen out of Seattle, was sentenced in the Roseburg justice court today to 30 days in the county jail after pleading guilty to a charge of operating a motor vehicle without registration card. Judge Thomas Hartfield ordered Lumsden's release to authorities from King county, Washington, upon their arrival.

Traffic fines reported by Judge Hartfield to have been paid into his court included William P. Phillips, \$15, overload; Donald L. Cook, \$10, no operator's license.

Death Decree for Killing Mother-in-Law Upheld

SALEM, Ore., June 12—(AP)—The state supreme court ruled 5 to 1 today that Andrew W. Dennis, Portland shipyard worker, must die for the murder of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Anna Belle McNallen.

Mrs. McNallen's strangled body was found in her apartment in Portland on Jan. 30, 1944. A jury convicted him and he was sentenced to die in the state prison's lethal gas chamber.

Dennis has stoutly maintained his innocence, claiming he was convicted only on circumstantial evidence. The state claimed he had accused Mrs. McNallen of breaking up Dennis' marriage.

R. G. Brown, Resident of Oakland, Found Dead

R. G. Brown, 66, a well known resident of Oakland, was found dead in his room there Monday. He apparently had died suddenly from a heart ailment and had been dead about three weeks, Coroner H. C. Stearns reported. The death was not discovered earlier because Brown frequently made trips to Portland without notifying anyone of his plans and when he failed to appear as usual it was presumed that he had again gone to Portland, the coroner reported. Efforts are being made to contact relatives.

Marylyn Jarvon Burgess, Aged Five Months, Dies

Marylyn Jarvon Burgess, five-months old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Burgess, died at her home in North Roseburg early today. She was the only child. She was a granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Burgess, Jefferson, Ore. Services will be held in the chapel of the Roseburg Funeral home at 10:30 o'clock Wednesday, with Rev. Wm. Ross officiating. Interment will follow in the Lookingglass cemetery.
