Borneo Oil Fields Needed in Drive Against Japan

Japanese reports of an allied landing near Brunel, Borneo, probably are correct and indicate another step in Gen. MacArthur's consolidation of his position for the ultimate drive against Japan.

Experts estimate that if we could recapture Borneo's oil fields, and find them quickly usable, it would be tantamount to a two-thirds increase in our tanker fleet in the Pacific for Borneo would give our naval vessels a source of oil thousands of miles nearer their scene of operations than at present.

The Brunel area in north Borneo, like the island of Tarakan already invaded by the Australians, is one of these rich fields. The Japanese report only one allied division in action so far. Yet it is so important that the Brunel installations be secured quickly that unless the Japs have pulled out completely this is likely to develop into a major operation. In fact, it is the type of job which MacArthur likes to supervise personally when not too involved in the over-all business of his theater. For it seems likely that the extent of damage done by the Japanese at Brunel and Tarakan might determine whether a campaign is worthwhile in the great Balikpapan fields, far down the east Borneo coast. Balikpapan is directly across from Japanese-held Celebes, which might involve an important neutralization operation. There would seem to be little reason for any of these campaigns unless there are good indications their resources can be converted to our use in time for the Japanese invasion. The same applies to Java. Cut off and largely impotent, Japanese forces in these areas hardly seem to constitute a sufficient menace to our rear to warrant major action.

Grounds for Jap Gloom
Meanwhile, other consolidation efforts go forward. American forces on Luzon have struck into the Cagayan valley, good fighting terrain which leads all the way to Aparri on the island's northern shore, and this campaign should take on a quickened tempo. The Japanese still hold something like 20,000 square miles here which is vitally needed for air bases nearer Formosa and the Japan-China supply lines. Once secured, even our fighter planes will be within range of everything from Hainan Island to

Okinawa and as much as 300 to 400 miles inland in China. Shuttle flights might be possible.

Liquid Fertilizer Good For Victory Gardens

Liquid fertilizers poured along continuous rows or about individual plants will promote rapid, steady growth of victory garden crops, says County Agent, J. Ro-

land Parker. Fertilizers applied in this manner are practical for small gardens and they will pay dividends in better quality vegetables and greater yields.

Liquid fertilizers may be made by dissolving a slightly rounded tablespoonful of victory garden fertilizer in a gallon of water. One gallon of this mixture should be poured on the soil along each 6 on 8 feet of growing crops every 8 or 10 days. About a quart of the liquid is suggested for each individual plant, such as cabbage or peppers. Growers are cautioned against making the mixture too strong, as this may damage the crops.

Big-Power Veto Issue Nears Vote

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12 (AP)—Both sides in the United Nations debate over the big-power veto decided today that the time had arrived to stop talking and start voting.

On this point Foreign Minister Evatt of Australia and Senator Tom Connally of the United States, opposing leaders, agreed. It appeared that the veto voting formula would be approved, but with several countries, which do not like it, not balloting.

The formula requires that the United States, Russia, Britain, China and France, as members of the proposed world security council, would have to concur before the council could take any step toward settling an international dispute—except that any nation party to a dispute would refrain from voting on peaceful settlement measures.

The main issue before the unit-

ed nations conference committee which has the formula in hand is an amendment by Evatt. It would eliminate the concurrence requirement, and therefore the veto, from peaceful settlements. It does not, however, challenge the concurrence requirement on use of force by the council.



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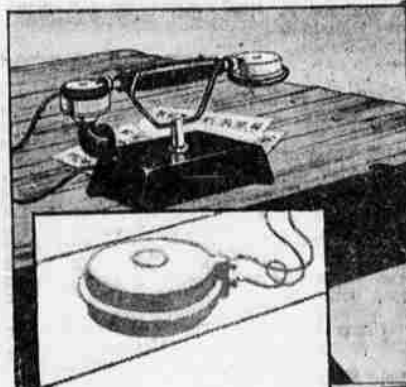
