

Yoncalla Soldier Acquires Title of "One-Man Army"

YONCALLA — PFC Wallace Thorpe, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Thorpe, Yoncalla, has been dubbed a one-man army by his comrades, according to public relations releases from the 27th infantry division.

Entering the battle for Okinawa with a company of General George W. Griner's "Appleknocker" regiment, Thorpe started out armed with a flame thrower, but as the battle progressed did about everything except run the battalion.

On the first day of the attack, which broke a week-long stalemate, he still had his flame thrower strapped to his back while helping evacuate casualties from exposed front line positions.

He alternated between operating his flame thrower, manning a machine gun, running ammunition, and finally firing a bazooka. In between times, he hauled water, rations and munitions and operated a radio from an advanced observation post, and finally, although only a PFC, assumed temporary command of a platoon.

"The men who have fought side by side with him along the steep ridges and in the treacherous gulches of Okinawa think very highly of him," an Okinawa combat reporter writes. His comrades say "he's like a mule; he never gets tired." He runs over the hills with a load on his back that would soon drop an ordinary man to his knees.

Okinaawa is the second major Pacific campaign for Thorpe. He participated in the conquest of Saipan in June and July 1944.

His wife, the former Sue Duncan, and their small son, make their home with Mrs. Thorpe's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Duncan, in Yoncalla.

Beavers' Lead Cut To Half Game by Losing to Rainiers

(By the Associated Press) Portland's Beavers, fighting to keep their floundering ship afloat in the Pacific Coast league race, found the Seattle Rainiers close-hauled a half game behind them today, while six and a half lengths in the rear five California clubs were bunched in a tight battle for third place.

The Rainiers opened another seam in the top-leaders craft last night by taking the first game of their crucial series in Beavertown.

Third-place Oakland's loss to San Francisco, and San Diego's second victory in a row over the fourth-spots Solons narrowed the gap between the third and seventh rungs to a game and a half. Hollywood's brightly-shining Stars nosed out Los Angeles for the second straight night to complete the night's schedule.

Seattle's 4-3 decision over Portland saw both teams score all their runs in the eighth inning. Beaver hurler Pulford's wildness plus an error by Shortstop O'Neil spotted the Rainiers to their four tallies, only two of which were earned. The hometowners came back in their half to score three runs.

San Francisco's mound ace Joyce, rang up his 13th victory of the season in downing Oakland 5-2 to tie the series at one-all.

San Diego took a free-scoring game from Sacramento 13-11 in 11 innings, with Pitcher Eaves playing the hero role to give him his second victory in two nights. Eaves went in as a relief hurler in the 10th, held the Solons hitless for two innings and proceeded to win his own ball game by polling out a two-run homer in the first of the 11th.

Hollywood again went into extra innings to win from Los Angeles 2-1 in the 10th frame. The game was a tight pitching battle all the way between Adams of the Angels and Smith of the Stars.

Europe Expects Too Much U. S. Aid, Senator Learns

WASHINGTON, June 13.—(AP)—What shattered Europe expects too much of the United States, says Senator Mitchell (D-Wash.). Mitchell, back from a trip that carried him and other members of the senate war investigating committee over most of western Europe, declared today:

"I was struck by the depend-

ence of these countries on the United States to open up magic gates and establish an immediate flow of prosperity. I sometimes fear the reaction when it is realized that the job just can't be done by a snap of the fingers."

More than anything, Mitchell told a reporter, he was impressed with the devastation in Germany. Many of the larger towns, he said, are "dead," with only a handful of people walking the streets.

He gave this view of Europe's needs:

Holland: Faces a tremendous draining job.
Scandinavian countries: Will be in pretty good shape if they are

able to get coal to start processing industries. Norway also needs ships and claims a loss of 50 per cent of her merchant fleet in helping the allies.

Belgium: Has started some production from her linen and paper mills.

Italy: With fuel, it may be able to start its industrial life blood flowing in the cotton textile mills.

Medford Votes Bonds For City Improvements

MEDFORD, Ore., June 13.—(AP)—All six city improvement projects received substantial majorities from Medford voters, a ballot count showed today.

The measures, approved in yesterday's balloting, will give Medford \$78,000 for sewers, \$235,000 for sewage disposal plant enlargement, \$35,000 for a new Jackson street bridge, \$102,000 for library enlargement, \$300,000 for storm sewers, and \$75,000 for park improvement.

For breakfast—CORN PANCAKES

2/3 cup all-purpose flour 2 tbsps. sugar
1/2 cup corn meal 1 tsp. salt
1 1/2 tbsps. baking powder 2 eggs
1/8 tsp. soda 2 cups milk
2 tbsps. melted shortening or margarine

Sift flour, measure, and sift again with corn meal, baking powder, soda, sugar, and salt. Beat egg yolks, add milk and combine with dry ingredients, beating until smooth. Add melted butter or margarine and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Drop by tablespoonfuls on moderately hot, lightly-greased griddle or heavy frying pan. Turn cakes when bubbles form on top surface. Bake until golden brown. Serve with equal amounts of melted butter or margarine and heated syrup. Makes 10 to 12 medium-size cakes.

DUMPLING QUICKIE

2 cups biscuit mix 1 cup milk
Place mix in bowl; add milk all at once; stir only until all of the flour is dampened. Drop dumplings by tablespoonfuls on gently boiling stew or liquid in large kettle with tight-fitting cover; cover; steam 15 minutes or until done, without removing cover. Makes 12 medium-size dumplings.
