Ample Irrigation "Must" if Victory Garden is Success

Adequate irrigation is practically a "must" for successful summer victory gardens in Douglas county, especially if there are long periods between good showers, says County Agent J. Roland Parker.

Many home gardeners who do not have water for irrigation readily available will have to take their chances on enough soil moisture to see their crops through but those who can get water on their crops will reap good dividends. An inch of rainfall a week if evenly distributed, states Mr. Parker, would be enough. But since Oregon summer rainfall is not geared to that schedule, supplemental irrigation to keep the soil moist is recommended.

Hand sprinkling of vegetable crops with the garden hose is of little value because seldom is enough water applied at any one time, the county agent explains. Most garden crops need to be watered enough so that the soil is wet at least six inches deep. Hand sprinkling washes the dust off the leaves and crops and makes them appear fresh, but does little or no good unless the gardener keeps at it until about an inch of water is applied throughout the garden.

Most successful gardeners prefer a set sprinkler, ditch irrigation through the rows or the soil soaker canvas hose method of applying water.

Quick-growing, leafy vegetables require more frequent watering than others and fast vigorous

growth is hurried by keeping the soil moist. Gardeners are cautioned against keeping the soil saturated, however, since plants require air in the soil as well as moisture.

In dry weather irrigation of the victory garden may be necessary about once a week.
