Calapooia Road Will be Surfaced In An Experiment

Surfacing of the Calapooia road east of Sutherlin will start Monday, it was announced today by the county court. The improvement is being undertaken in the nature of an experiment to determine the value of road oiling in saving tires and aiding heavy logging traffic. County Judge D. N. Busenbark reported. Logging and mill operators have purchased the oil necessary for surfacing, and the work will be done by the county under a cooperative agreement with the Public Roads administration. The United Contractors, Inc., Portland, now engaged in street repair work in Roseburg, will furnish equipment and labor under contract with the county. Two-lift oil and rock surface will be applied to nine miles of the road, the county's principal logging route. A substantial rock foundation already is in place. Surfacing is expected to reduce wear and tear on tires, as well as eliminating traffic hazards created by dust.

Dunham's, Olympia Win Ball Games

"SEATTLE, June 16—(AP)—"Practically all" transactions in beef at the present time in this district are above ceiling prices, district food rationing officer B. J. Fotheringham said yesterday. Fotheringham said the fact had been called to the attention of Washington, D. C., authorities and that he hoped some thing would be done about it soon. He said it was correct that if fresh meat packers bought and sold at ceiling prices they would lose money.

"Until the price system is worked out, we're going to be up against it for meat," he said.

Rescue of Comrade in Naval Fight Wins Medal For W. C. Stevens



William Clark Stevens, above, RM 2/c USNR, patient in ward 46, U. S. naval hospital Seattle, was presented with the Navy-Marine Corps Medal in a ceremony May 23 at the hospital. Stevens, whose wife Mrs. Pauline Stevens resides at 9524 East Madison, Seattle, formerly resided at Roseburg, where he was employed by the J. C. Penney Co. In addition to his recent honor, Stevens wears the Purple Heart medal for wounds received in action. He took part in actions at Saipan, Tinian, Moritave, Guam and Leyte and the surface battle, second battle of the Philippines. Said the citation received by Stevens and signed by Vice Adm. C. Kinkaid, Comm. Seventh fleet: "For distinguishing himself by heroism in rescuing a shipmate, while based on the U. S. S. L. O., during her action with enemy surface forces and aircraft in the vicinity of the Philippine Islands on October 25, 1944. With complete disregard for his own safety and at great risk to his life, Stevens rescued a mate who had been seriously wounded by an explosion on the flight deck. Ignoring flames and flying debris, he went into the wreckage and brought back the wounded man. His loyalty and steadfast devotion, above the normal call of duty, was a great inspiration to all officers and men aboard. His conduct throughout was in accordance with the highest traditions of the navy of the United States."

Chungking Scoured By Epidemic of Cholera

CHUNGKING, June 16—(AP)—More than 2,000 persons were estimated unofficially to be suffering from Cholera in the Chinese capital today. Authorities battled to halt spread of the epidemic. Eating houses and soft drink establishments were placed off limits for U. S. military personnel. No cases were reported among American soldiers. Many foreigners sought inoculations. Inadequate sanitary facilities in Chungking and the public's unawareness of the causes and means of prevention of Cholera increased the danger.

Japs Can Carry on 18 Months More, Scribe Says

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16—(AP)—Fred Hampson, veteran Associated Press correspondent of the Pacific war, said yesterday "the Japanese can keep the war going 18 more months if they want to, although they are hopelessly licked." The 43-year-old Portland, Ore., newsman returned to the U. S. after serving 23 months on the war fronts from Empress Augusta bay at Bougainville to the liberation and cleanup of the Philippines. "The G's are good fighters out there," he observed, "but they are getting tired of the war. The newness is gone, the going is hard and the enemy tenacious."

Health Association Post Given Rev. W. Coughlan

The Rev. Wm. Coughlan, pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic church in Roseburg, has been appointed a representative of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, having been nominated by the Douglas County Public Health association. Appointments were made at the association state meeting in Portland Friday.

Disease Deadlier Than Bombs Among Children

LONDON, June 16—(AP)—Nine thousand children under 15 years of age in England and Wales died of diphtheria during the war—a thousand more than were killed by enemy bombs, the ministry of health announced today. The announcement told of a new summer campaign for immunization.

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Allied Navy Increasing Pressure on Japanese (Continued from Page 1)

Gen. Buckner, whose Tenth army troops narrowed the Nipponese hold to eight square miles. Naval bombardment of Truk, Tokyo said, was carried out yesterday by two cruisers and four destroyers in conjunction with a carrier attack which reached its third successive day today. The Japanese offered no explanation for this attack, presumably by British forces, on the once mighty Nipponese base in the Caroline Islands.

Tokyo also reported more than 25 Superforts made four minelaying expeditions into Japanese waters during the early morning hours. These mines are taking an unknown toll of the Mikado's shipping in addition to the daily announced bags of air raiders. Today's reports listed 14 coastal vessels and schooners sunk and six wrecked on the ways—mostly in Shanghai waters.

Kyushu Being Fortified
While hundreds of American warships, loaded cargo vessels and landing craft are pouring into Okinawa waters, Tokyo said, U. S. naval patrols have been extended to within 200 miles of Japan.

To meet this threat Japanese were reported converting their nearest island, Kyushu, "into one large fortress at amazing speed."

Naval guns strongly supported three Yank divisions which have badly bent the enemy's suicide line on Okinawa. After months of tortuous campaigning through northern Philippine mountains, the U. S. 37th infantry broke out onto the broad plains of Cagayan valley in a 22 miles advance in 24 hours. Two towns were liberated in the valley where the climatic battles of Luzon island are expected. All other Yank divisions in the Philippines made small advances.

Chinese reported fighting around four towns on the approaches to the Canton-Hongkong area. China-based U. S. air forces strafed enemy troop columns, knocked out 19 locomotives and 17 river boats. British artillery and mortars helped speed the Nipponese retreat from Burma.

Lt. Gen. Morehead, Australian corps commander, proclaimed martial law in recaptured north-west Borneo as his troops completed conquest of Labuan island and its Timpulal airfield, at the entrance to Brunai bay. Gen. MacArthur announced bombing attacks on Balikpapan airdromes, similar to raids preceding the Brunei invasion. Balikpapan is 500 miles south and slightly east of Brunei, on the opposite coast, and 400 miles below invaded Tarakan.

MacArthur's headquarters disclosed only 1,447 of 18,000 Americans taken prisoner on Bataan and Corregidor have been liberated. Known dead are 3,260. How many of the others are dead or still prisoners of the Japanese is not known.

In Washington, the war department reported 70 per cent of army equipment in Europe could be used against Japan. Among Japanese worries was finding a place to hide. The emperor's government reported it was building 1,200 emergency dwellings for Superfort victims and experimenting with dugout homes.
