No Disgrace Seen
"I am turning you over to Col.
Stent. You will be treated well.
You are now prisoners of war.
It is not a disgraceful state and
you are not to regard it as such."
First reports of the officer-led
Japanese group were heard last
September. Numerous efforts
had been made to reach him
through a truck-mounted loud
speaker system and leaflets
dropped from an airplane.
One day a prisoner reported he
had sought the Japanese officer's
emission to surrender and had
been told:
"I am thinking of doing the
same thing myself."
Stent followed up a hunch and
rigged up a sound truck in the
area. Just as the Japanese were
believed about to give up, a
young medium-sized man, looking
a bit heavy for his height and
blinking in the bright sun, came
from the jungle.
Ask for English Teaching
In the ensuing talk, the Japanese
admitted his country would not
win the war and said he
wanted to "sit out the war" in
the Guam jungle. He was told
that was impossible.
He left for further deliberation,
agreeing to return a week
later.
He arrived at the appointed
time with a retinue of lookout
troops who now were holding
forward, said American officers,
to a Japan in which bushido does
not exist.
They piled into a weapons carrier
and were taken to the island
command prison stockade. The
first request of the Japanese
field officer was that they be
taught English. Informal classes

Deportation Order on Harry Bridges Invalid

reme court ruled that past membership in the communist party was not a ground for deporting an alien.

Then congress amended the law to make past membership in organizations advocating violent overthrow of the government a cause for deportation.

Biddle began the present proceedings in May, 1942, after adoption of the amendment. Bridges attacked the deportation order in habeas corpus proceedings, but Biddle was upheld by the lower federal courts.

Justice Douglas said for the majority that Bridges had been ordered deported "on a misconception of the term 'affiliation' as used in the statute and by reason of an unfair hearing on the question of his membership in the communist party, his detention under the warrant is unlawful."

"Accordingly," Douglas said, "it is unnecessary for us to consider the larger constitutional questions which have been advanced in the challenge to the legality of petitioner's (Bridges) detention under the deportation order."

Douglas said the legislative history of the deportation statute throws little light on the meaning of "affiliation."

Sympathy not Affiliation
(This reference was to Bridges' alleged "affiliation" with the communist party.)

"It imports, however, less than membership but more than sympathy," he said. "By the terms of the statute it includes those who contribute money or anything of value to an organization which believes, advises, advocates, or teaches the overthrow of our government by force or violence. That example throws light on the meaning of the term 'affiliation.'"

"Like nations, may cooperate in a common cause over a period of months or years

though their ultimate aims do not coincide. Alliances for limited objectives are well known. Certainly those who joined forces with Russia to defeat the Nazi may not be said to have made an alliance to spread the cause of communism. An individual who makes contributions to feed hungry men does not become 'affiliated' with the communist cause because those men are communists. A different result is not necessarily indicated if aid is given to or received from a proscribed organization in order to win a legitimate objective in a domestic controversy."

Murphy Flays Prosecution
Justice Murphy in an opinion concurring with the majority ascertained that "the record in this case will stand forever as a monument to man's intolerance of man."

"Seldom if ever in the history of this nation has there been such a concentrated and relentless crusade to deport an individual because he dared to exercise the freedom that belongs to him as a human being and that is guaranteed by the constitution," Murphy stated.

He added that proof of Bridges' alleged membership and affiliation with the communist party "was shown by some of the most tenuous and unreliable evidence ever to be introduced in an administrative or legal proceeding."

Chief Justice Stone in his dissent said that "when the authority to deport the aliens turns on a determination of facts by the attorney general, the courts are without authority to disturb his finding if it has the support of evidence of any probative value."

The chief justice said that he, Roberts and Frankfurter "are of opinion that the finding of Bridges' membership in the communist party, standing alone supports the deportation order, and that the finding is supported by evidence. We deem it unnecessary to consider other contentions to which the court's opinion is principally directed."

SAN FRANCISCO, June 18—(AP)—Harry Bridges was awakened today and informed the U. S. Supreme court had invalidated his deportation order.

"Ok," was the CIO longshoremen leader's only comment.

the general asserted the "problems of peace can be no more difficult than the one you had to solve more than three years ago * * * with the same determination, the same optimistic resolution and the same mutual consideration among allies * * * the problems of peace can and must be met."

Hundreds of thousands of wildly shouting men, women and children, veterans of this war and the last, wounded veterans, the old and the young, raised their voices in a mighty tumult as the general of the army rode through their midst.

Teamwork Praised
General Eisenhower made these other points:

The late president and Prime Minister Churchill were "two Godgiven men" to whom the world owes lasting obligation. In Churchill, Roosevelt "had a worthy partner, who had led his country through its blackest hour in 1940."

British and Americans "forgot differences in customs and methods—even national prejudice—in their devotion to a common cause."

The campaigns of the red army, crushing all resistance in the east, played a decisive part in the defeat of Germany.

The banners of victory cannot

hide from sight these sacrifices in which victory has been bought. "The hard task of a commander is to send men into battle knowing some of them—often many—must be killed or wounded in order that necessary missions may be achieved. It is soul killing!"

"My sorrow is not only for the fine young lives lost or broken, but it is equally for the parents, the wives and the friends who have been bereaved. The price they pay is possibly the greatest of their grief can be relieved only by the faith that all this shall not happen again!"

Acclaimed in Congress
On arriving at the capitol the smiling Eisenhower strode down the center aisle of a house chamber reverberating with cheers and applause.

Members of congress and packed galleries applauded, whistled and cheered for two full minutes as the tall, sunburned Kansan walked down the aisle to take up position behind a battery of 12 microphones. He nodded and grinned while the stirring welcome rolled in waves through the packed room.

DuFresne said Evans was siphoning gasoline from an automobile tank and his soaked clothes were ignited. Death occurred yesterday.

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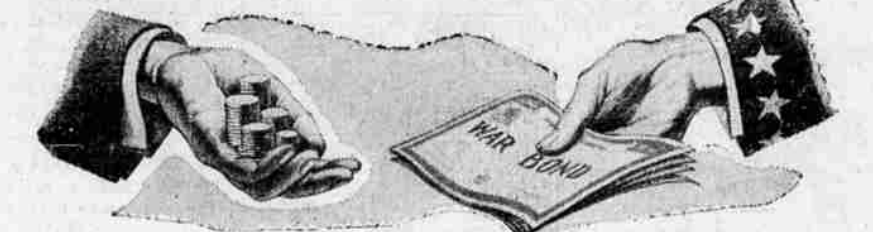
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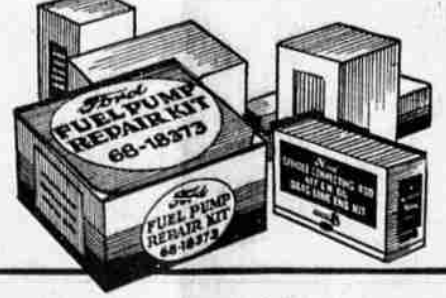
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
