U. S. Officers Organize Plan Of Replacement for Gallant Japanese-American Soldiers

LAKE GARDA, Italy.—(AP)—Officers of the U. S. 442nd infantry regiment have organized their own replacement plan for the Japanese-American soldiers returning home after gallant fighting with the regiment in Italy and France.

Through arrangements by a committee of three officers, every Nisei soldier heading home takes with him the names of men already contacted in America who will help him locate in the place and in the industry or profession he wants.

Along with that he will have letters of reference from his company, battalion and regimental commanders attesting to his membership in one of the most decorated outfits in the army.

The plan was originated by Lt. William Wolf, Evanston, Ill., who serves on the committee along with Lt. Edward R. Williams, Chicago, and Capt. California (Cable) Ushiro, originally a Californian whose address now is the Heart Mountain War relocation center in Wyoming.

The system was arranged specifically for soldier victims of exclusion tactics on the Pacific coast—for fellows like T. S. Sagie Nishioka, Hood River, Ore.

The other day Sagie received a note from his mother, who is in the Wyoming relocation camp with his 16-year-old brother and a sister.

Her note began, "I suppose you've heard your name has been taken off the soldier rolls at Hood River."

(The Hood River Post No. 22 of the American Legion restored the names of 15 Nisei, including Sagie Nishioka, to its honor roll on last March 6 upon the order of the Legion's national commander, Nishioka was born in Hood River on February 10, 1920, and in-

MEAT: BUTTER, CHEESE—Red Stamps: Book 4—E2 through J2 valid through June 30. K2 through P2 valid through July 31. Q2 through U2 valid through Aug. 31. V2 through Z2 valid through Sept. 30.

SHOES: Loose stamps invalid. Book 2—Portland stamps 1-2-3 now valid. New shoe stamp valid August 1.

W. S. Carpenter, Sutherland Vet of World War 1, Dies

Worth "Bill" Spencer Carpenter, 52, died Monday evening, June 18, at his home in Sutherland, Oregon, following a heart attack. He was born October 23, 1892, at Mount Carroll, Ill., and came to Oregon prior to World War I. Previously he lived in Montana with his parents. He was married to Valma Balsehweid at Forest Grove, Ore., February 10, 1923.

During World War I he served as captain with the first division of the U. S. marine corps. He also served in the Mexican expedition in 1916. He became engaged in the lumber industry about 1920 which he has continually followed until the time of his death. He has been employed by Davis and Woods Lumber company at Sutherland as lumber inspector and grader.

He is survived by his wife, Valma Carpenter, and daughter, Joan, of Sutherland.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Roseburg Funeral Home Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock. Dr. Morris Roach officiating. Concluding the services, cremation will be held at Eugene crematorium.
