ing of the charter until next week Mr. Truman proceeded, the White House said, on the assumption the meeting could wind up this week. The president will witness the signing of the charter before delivering a closing address voicing "goodspeed" to the new experiment in international relations. He will fly the charter back to Washington and submit it immediately to the senate in the hope of ratification before his meeting next month with Premier Stalin and Prime Minister Churchill to sketch the pattern for European peace terms.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 19 — (AP)—Harry S. Truman, now head of the nation, was coming back today to the capital city he visited only eight months ago as a candidate for the No. 2 job in the United States.
This visit—three times scheduled and twice cancelled by the pressure of international events—is planned as a get-together for two old friends, President Truman and Gov. Mon C. Wallgren of Washington. They served together in the senate and both were members of the investigating group commonly known as the Truman committee.

assembly to discuss any subject bearing on international relations. Russia objected that this was too broad a grant. Last week soviet Ambassador Gromyko insisted that the field must be limited to matters affecting the maintenance of peace and security.
Small nations balked and Secretary of State Stettinius, Gromyko and Herbert V. Evans of Australia formed a subcommittee to resolve the issue Sunday. They failed to get agreement at that time on an Evans compromise allowing discussion of any matter "within the scope" of the united nations charter.

But yesterday Gromyko indicated in a meeting of the Big Five that it might be acceptable and leaders hoped for final word today. Unless it is received, they saw little prospects for a windup Saturday. Even with Russian acceptance it was touch-and-go whether all the technical work of drafting and translating can be completed in time.

oil refinery center of western Borneo for days, Japanese broadcasts reported today, but "there are yet no definite indications that the enemy plans to invade the area."
Tokyo radio said the naval bombardment began last Friday. There has been no confirmation of any of the Japanese broadcasts which first reported a fleet of more than 20 warships, including three battleships and an aircraft carrier, was moving toward Balikpapan last Thursday.

Today's southwest Pacific communiqué told of continued air raids on Balikpapan defense advances on two accomplished invasions of Borneo, and gains in the Philippines, sometimes by troops meeting practically no Japanese except those coming in to surrender.
Japs Torch Everything
Australian troops in Borneo, plunging into Sarawak, reached Tutong, 35 miles from the original Brunei invasion point and 25 miles north of the vital Seria oil fields, which Japanese demoli-

tionists were methodically firing. Associated Press Correspondent James Hutcheson reported flames from the burning oil wells were visible for 60 miles and P-T boats a half-mile off the Seria coast could feel the heat.
Other assaults who landed on the eastern shores of Brunei bay at Weston were moving inland with negligible opposition. This force guards the back door of the invasion from possible enemy reinforcement attempts by the narrow-gauge railway from Jesselton, 70 miles north.
Luzon Japs in Flight
Associated Press War Correspondent Hamilton Faron reported that the hastily withdrawing Japanese on Luzon harassed constantly by the Fifth air force and concentrated artillery fire and tanks nipping at their heels, were virtually whipped.

All along the highways en route to the front, far up the broad plains of the Cagayan valley, I saw shattered enemy trucks, tanks and other mechanized vehicles," Faron said. "It is compelling evidence of the pounding the enemy transports took as they pulled back before the driving 37th."

the Japanese.
Adm. Nimitz, over-all commander of the operations, issued this message to the forces under his command:
"Although we join in grieving over the loss of your able and courageous leader, Lt. Gen. Buckner, all of us in the Pacific ocean areas take pride in the day of victory on which he gallantly met a soldier's death."
By the achievements of the Tenth army in the Okinawa campaign under his leadership, we will all gain new inspiration to overcome any and all obstacles standing between us and final victory over Japan.
Nimitz did not elaborate on his reference to "the day of victory," but Vice Adm. Harry Hill, in a message of condolence, also referred to Buckner's "untimely death in the hour of victory."

Son of Noted Father
Expressions of regret also were made by Secretaries Stimson and Forrestal and by Adm. Ernest King.
Thus ended the career of the second American lieutenant general to bear the name of Simon Bolivar Buckner.

The first was his father, who was forced to surrender Fort Donelson to Gen. U. S. Grant early in the civil war, but who was exchanged and rose to a lieutenant general before that war ended. Later he was governor of Kentucky, where Simon, Jr., was born near Mumfordsville, July 18, 1888.

Young Buckner attended Virginia Military Institute and then the U. S. military academy at West Point, where he was graduated in 1908. He served two tours of duty in the Philippines, was an early student of aviation, and twice was an instructor at West Point where he later was commandant, from 1933 to 1936. When the Japanese raided Dutch Harbor in June, 1942, his planes forced them back to Attu and Kiska.

Advisor in Aleutians
Buckner was an advisor in the Aleutians campaign that followed, although he did not participate physically—a fact that he vocally regretted.
He was promoted to lieutenant general May 4, 1943, and a year later was relieved of command of the Alaskan department and dropped out of sight. Although it was not known to the public, he actually was being given the chance he yearned for—action as a field commander.
The general is survived by his

widow, and by two sons and a daughter.
Simon Bolivar Buckner III is a captain in the signal corps in Europe; William Claiborne Buckner is a West Point cadet; and May Buckner is a Red Cross worker in San Francisco, where Mrs. Buckner also resides.

speaker be next in line of succession and that he should serve not longer than until the next congressional election or until a special election called for the purpose of electing a new president and vice president.
This period the congress should fix, he asserted. The individuals elected at such general or special election should then serve only to fill the unexpired term of the former president and vice president.
"In this way," Mr. Truman said "there would be no interference with the normal four year interval of general national elections."

Temporary Duty Provided
He said the speaker should resign as a representative in congress as well as speaker of the house before he assumes the presidency.
He recommended further that the succession pass to the president pro tempore of the senate if there is no qualified speaker or if the speaker fails to qualify. The president pro tempore would hold the office only until a duly qualified speaker is elected.
"If there be neither speaker nor president pro tempore qualified to succeed on the creation of the vacancy, then the succession might pass to the members of the cabinet as now provided, until a duly qualified speaker is elected," Closest to People.

Bills similar to that recommended by the president already are pending in congress. Interest in them has risen since it was disclosed the president was contemplating many long distance flights, including one to Berlin next month to meet Marshal Stalin and Prime Minister Churchill.

In explaining why he picked the speaker, who now is Sam Rayburn of Texas, over the president pro tempore of the senate, now Senator Kenneth D. McKellar of Tenn., for first in line of succession, Mr. Truman said the speaker is not only elected in his own district but also is elected to preside over the house by a vote of all the representatives of all the people.
"As a result," he said "I believe that the speaker is the official in the federal government whose selection next to that of the president and vice-president can be most accurately said to stem from the people themselves."

Senate Barrier Explained
He said a new house is elected every two years and always at the same time the president and vice-president. Also, he added, the house is usually in agreement politically with the chief executive.

"Only one-third of the senate, however, is elected with the president and vice-president," he said. "The senate might, therefore have a majority hostile to the policies of the president, and might conceivably fill the presidential office with one not in sympathy with the will of the majority of the people."
