6-Party Cabinet Formed in Italy

ROME, June 20—(AP)—Actionist Party Leader Ferruccio Parri assumed control of the new Italian government today as premier with the assertion that "I am just an ordinary man, not a politician."

He announced his slate of ministers last night. The socialists, allotted three posts as were the communists, liberals and labor-democrats, expressed discontent because the actionists and Christian-democrats received four posts each.

"I accepted the premiership because I was called to Rome by the committee of national liberation and I believe it is my patriotic duty to accept," the new premier said. "It will be an interesting adventure."

He succeeded Ivanoe Bonomi. When addressed for the first time last night as "Your Excellency," Parri frowned and said "I don't like that."
