surrender business. But there are hints in the news of faint cracks appearing in the hitherto smooth and polished surface of Bushido.

There can be little doubt that the cold-blooded Jap leadership HOPES we will become nauseated with Jap-killing and lose our nerve at the prospect of having to kill them all.

We can't help hoping a little that the cannon-fodder type of Jap might become nauseated by the bleak prospect of dying uselessly.

ABOUT all the surrendering reported so far (which is on a microscopic scale in comparison with the huge numbers involved) indicates at best is that SOME JAPS are getting SOME SENSE.

OUR B-29s continue their fire bombing of Japan's smaller industrial cities. Three of them and Toyohashi on Honshu and Fukuoaka on Kyushu. All are about the size of Sacramento.

ONE of our returning pilots says he doesn't think we'll have to go back to Shizuoka. "Another reports that he saw a 'solid mass of fire roll over Toyohashi'."

THERE will be a lot of that kind of stuff in the coming months. The Japs are undoubtedly getting their war industries under ground as fast as they can, but we aren't going to give them time to do a really good job of burrowing under.

JAP broadcasts say that our (alleged) naval forces are sweeping the mines from Balikpapan harbor (which, if true, means that we're getting ready to land).

The Australians are mopping up around Brunel bay, which they are readying as a great allied naval and air base. They are creeping up on the burning Seria oil field to the south, and are within 20 miles of it as this is written.

THERE is a whiff of the foulness of war in the Philippines dispatches. Pilots flying over the bamboo forests that cover Manila's much-fought-over watershed report that hundreds of feet up the stench of decaying Jap bodies is sickening.

THERE is a faintly hopeful note in the Russian news. General Afanasiev, chief prosecutor of the 16 Poies on trial for subversive activities behind Russian lines, asks the Russian court for NO DEATH PENALTIES — only imprisonment.

COUNTY COURT PUZZLED

The Douglas county court declares willingness to make improvements to the North Umpqua road to relieve transportation handicaps facing log truckers, but professes inability to solve technical problems involved.

In the meantime, a most dangerous situation is building up. Independent truck operators declare they will take their equipment off the run if something is not done within the next 30 days to improve the road surface.

The county court makes no denial of these conditions, aside from claims that overloads and excessive speed contribute partly to equipment breakage and tire wear.

The severity of the problem is recognized, but the court admits it doesn't know what to do about it. Scarifying and blading at this time of the year is useless, the court contends, because it simply loosens the surface, which is promptly kicked off the road by the heavily weighted vehicles.

On the Calapooia road the court is experimenting with a two-lift, oil and crushed rock surface. Operators paid for the oil. Whether the experiment will be successful remains to be seen.

The court wants the operators to assist in buying oil and rock for the experiment, but gives no guarantee that the new surface will be permanent.

In the meantime, truckers have laid their problem before the War Production board and are meeting today with the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce road committee.

It is to be hoped that some satisfactory solution to this problem may be found with the least possible delay, as serious damage to industry and to production of lumber for war needs may result if prompt action is not obtained.

Rent Control — How it Operates

(Editor's Note—This is one of a series of articles authorized by the Rent Control division of the OPA. For general information on landlords, tenants and owners of rental property, specific information may be obtained at rent control board headquarters in the OPA office, Roseburg.)

Note to tenants: The OPA rent office does not: 1. Furnish a list of vacant dwellings or otherwise find you a home.

2. Say whether or not you can have certain privileges such as pets. That's up to your landlord, not yours.

3. Protect you from eviction if you create a nuisance, refuse to pay your rent or otherwise play the role of a bad tenant.

4. Force your landlord to furnish any services or equipment not furnished on the freeze-date of first rental.

5. Act as a court of human relations in settling irrelevant squabbles with your landlord or with other tenants.

Pvt. L. A. Donelan Wins Promotion In Luzon Battle

WITH THE 25TH INFANTRY (Tropical Lightning) DIVISION ON LUZON ISLAND, Philippines.—From the battlegrounds of northern Luzon, more than the 25th division is now in its fifth consecutive month of action against the Japanese, comes word of the promotion of Pvt. Louis A. Donelan, son of Clem Donelan, Myrtle Creek, to private first class.

A veteran of the 25th division's battles on the central Luzon plains and the recent fierce, bloody, fighting in the Caraballo mountains as the "Tropic Light" troops inched their way to the important Baletta pass and on to Santa Fe, Pfc. Donelan is a mechanic on an M-7 gun carriage, the mobile artillery of the doughboys that have been blasting the Nips on Luzon.

The 25th division, commanded by Maj. Gen. Charles L. Mullins, Jr., has experienced more than three and one-half years overseas service in this war. They were present at the Pearl Harbor attack and later went into action against the Japanese on Guadalcanal, New Georgia and Vella Lavella in the Solomon Islands.

Before entering the army, Pfc. Donelan was employed by the Conley Logging company, Ashland, Oregon.

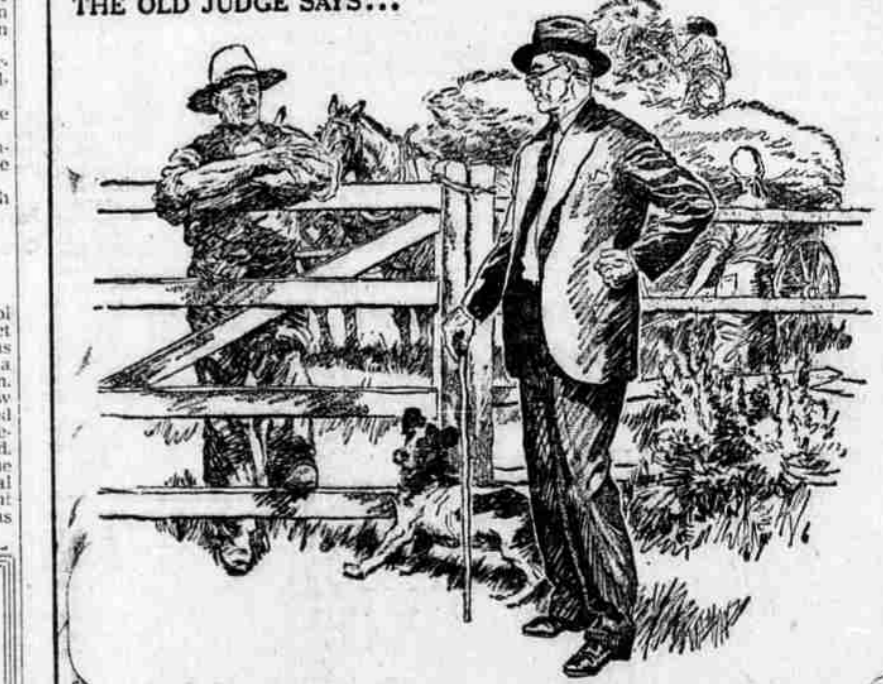
