WASHINGTON, June 22—(AP)—Although farm labor decreased sharply in May and June compared with 1944, farm wage rates in Oregon and Washington gained steadily, the Bureau of Agricultural Economics reported today.

The wage rates already were more than double the 1942 rates. Increases on rates between April 1 and June 1: Oregon — with board, from \$132 to \$139; without board, \$168 to \$171. Washington — with board, \$138 to \$144; without, \$176 to \$189.

Spring Pig Crop Short Of Government's Goal

WASHINGTON, June 22—(AP)—The Agriculture department reported today that the 1945 spring pig crop totaled about 51,687,000 head.

This was far short of the government's goal of 57,500,000 head.

The spring pig crop will move to market for slaughter next fall and winter.

The department said the combined spring and fall pig crops of 1945 was expected to be only a little larger than last year's small wartime crop.
