Polish Govt. Plan Unites Rival Units

MOSCOW, June 23.—(AP)—Assignment of cabinet posts in a new Polish government of national unity is expected to be made in Warsaw next week following the announcement last night that a major stumbling block in allied harmony had been removed by agreement of rival Polish factions on the structure of the new regime.

A statement issued by the three-man commission authorized by the Big Three at the Crimea conference to deal with the Polish problem said representatives of the soviet-sponsored Warsaw government, former members of the London exiled government, and democratic leaders from Poland had agreed upon formation of the new administration.

The decision reached at the Crimea conference called for a Polish election after a period whose duration has not yet been stipulated. Complete fulfillment of the Crimea agreement will not be accomplished until an election is held under conditions approved by the three-power commission.

Japanese Slay Own Wounded; 120 Bodies Found

MANILA, June 23.—(AP)—Bodies of 120 Japanese soldiers, bayoneted or shot by their comrades as they lay in bed, have been discovered in an abandoned enemy field hospital on northern Luzon, Gen. MacArthur's headquarters announced today.

Even before American troops made the gruesome discovery in an enemy hospital at Bayombong north of Manila, evidence had been accumulated that the Japanese ordered the ruthless extermination of their wounded.

The Japanese had withdrawn before the hospital could be set ablaze, permitting army signal corp photographers to make a record of the appalling scene of death.

Headquarters also released extracts from Japanese documents and statements by prisoners captured by the Americans citing the enemy's attitude toward his own sick and wounded, a spokesman adding: "This is the best evidence we can glean to prove that the Japanese slaughter their wounded."

for Chicago's 1,700 seized lines appeared drawing to an end. Government and union officials said more drivers were returning to their jobs and improved transportation was reported as army drivers and escorts, already totaling more than 20,000, because better acquainted with their routes.

There was no immediate indication of settlement of a strike of 15,000 glass workers in 10 cities. The workers are from six Pittsburgh plate glass plants and from four Libbey-Owens Ford plants.

More than one-half of Detroit's idle were from the Packard Motor Car company, 20,000 staying off the job producing aircraft engines and marine engines for PT boats. Others include 7,500 at the Briggs Manufacturing company and 1,000 at the Bend Wheel company.

Forty of the 400 striking bus drivers and mechanics of the St. Louis Transit company of Louisiana have been reclassified by draft boards.

There was no decided change in the situation in other strike centers.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 23.—(AP)—Roy Miller, 166, 19-year-old Kansas City puncher, defeated Leo (the Lion) Turner, 163, Portland, in their 10-round main event here last night.

Miller, 1944 Kansas City Golden Gloves champion and a protégé of Henry Armstrong, was the aggressor throughout, and the only real threat from Turner came in the 10th round. By that time it was too late to offset Miller's point advantage.

Leroy Durst, 156, Longview, Wash., kayaked Lili Abner, 153, Portland, in the third round of a scheduled 10. Abner was knocked down for counts of five and eight in the second, Durst polished him off after one minute, six seconds of the third with a long overhand right to the chin.

Indian Johnny Gates, 161, married from Klamath Falls, won a 10-round decision over Manuel James, 154, Denver, in a close bout.

Jap Suicide Planes Take Toll of U. S. Ships

Their last large-scale air assault was on June 6 and 7, when American gunners and fighters shot down 111 of them.

Grim Mop-Up Continues
As American soldiers and marines grimly hunted out the last scattered remnants of Japanese troops, and the Stars and Stripes were raised formally over the island Friday, the enemy threw in 20 separate raids in small groups.

Patrols of the victorious U. S. Tenth army killed 596 of the diehards Thursday night and early Friday while 160 others used hand grenades to commit suicide.

Having massed on Okinawa the greatest concentration of artillery they have yet used on the Pacific islands, the Japanese were down to five machine guns yesterday.

Al Dopking, Associated Press correspondent on Okinawa reported Japanese prisoners streamed out of their caves and into American hands so rapidly that soldiers had to hustle to get the horde into compounds. Most had been wounded but all looked well-fed.

At most, several hundred snipers remained in the island's 485 square miles of rugged terrain. Many had run out of ammunition, and the others were being stalked by American riflemen and flame-throwers.

(Prime Minister Churchill sent President Truman a congratulatory message calling the battle of Okinawa "among the most intense and famous in military history.")

Japs in Luzon Death Trap
Meanwhile the precise spot where the Japanese first invaded the Philippines has become their death trap.

The Nipponese landed Dec. 10,

1941, at Aparri on the north tip of Luzon. Today Gen. MacArthur disclosed that Aparri has been recaptured in a surprise thrust which bottled up the last major enemy force on the island in a stretch of less than 50 miles of the Cagayan valley.

It marks the beginning of the end of organized Japanese resistance on Luzon, reinvaded by MacArthur last Jan. 9.

An enemy force, estimated at possibly 20,000 effectives, faced the hard choice of standing and dying in broken up groups in the valley or waiting out a slow death in mountain refuges.

Borneo Invasion Gains
On western Borneo, the Australians have overrun the 4,000-foot Miri airfield a mile south of occupied Lutong and patrols ranged on toward Miri town without meeting strong opposition.

(Without elaboration, Tokyo radio said and allied fleet "of more than 50 large vessels and landing barges, escorted by two cruisers and two destroyers, approached an area fronting Miri" Wednesday.)

Today's communique reported a 240-ton rain of explosives by 50 Liberators on Balikpapan. This oil center on Borneo's east coast has taken a daily aerial pounding.

ernment agencies.
This order becomes effective July 1.

Such slaughterers will be required to set aside 30 percent of the present 50 percent of their output of choice, good and commercial grades of beef, and 65 percent of the present 75 percent of the canner and cutter grade, for the government.

This contemplated reduction in military buying would cover a season of the year when marketings of meat animals are at their lowest level. A sharp increase in cattle and hog marketing is expected in the fall. Army buying at higher levels would be resumed then.

No Canned Foods Cut

Reduced war and government requirements will prevent the sharp decreases estimated earlier in civilian supplies of canned fruits and vegetables.

The civilian supply of canned fruits from this year's pack will be about the same as last year and of commercially canned vegetables only about 10 to 15 percent smaller than last year.
