Execution Date Set for Oregon Officer's Killer

VALE, Ore., June 27.—(AP)—Kenneth William Bailey, 26, Klamath Falls, was sentenced today to die in the state's gas chamber August 10 for the slaying of Police Sgt. Tpd R. Chambers.

Bailey, convicted of first degree murder last Saturday, listened stolidly to the sentence pronounced by Circuit Judge M. A. Briggs, then Bailey turned to thank the defense attorney, smiled, and walked jauntily out of the courtroom.

Chambers, a state police officer, was fatally shot in a gun battle near Weiser, Idaho, April 29.

Postwar Setup of CCC Asked by Oregon VFW

PORTLAND, June 27.—(AP)—The Oregon department of Veterans of Foreign Wars wants the civilian conservation corps to be reestablished after the war.

The VFW said in a resolution that the plan would both rehabilitate returning veterans and improve the forests.

Other resolutions asked the state to establish a home for aged veterans and proposed a fund to pay for fishing and hunting licenses for servicemen on furlough.

"Kill" Order Issued in War on Safe Crackers

PORTLAND, June 27.—(AP)—A squad of detectives, hand-picked for their marksmanship, has been ordered to "shoot to kill" in a city police department move to break up a wave of safe cracking.

Detective Chief J. J. Keegan told the seven-man squad more than 1,000 men in the Portland area are known to have police and prison records involving safe robberies, some of them "desperate and experienced criminals."

He reported thugs have looted business strong-boxes of \$75,000 to \$100,000 in recent weeks.

Allies Invading Isle Closer to Jap Mainland

thurs reported today. Instead of fighting to the end in the lowlands, at least half of an estimated 20,000 Japanese on north Luzon were extricating themselves in a withdrawal to the mountainous wilderness of the Sierra Madres on the east, leaving rear guards to fight a delaying action.

The same situation is true on Mindanao, where time and space are running out for the enemy west of Davao. Although they still are fighting fiercely, it was obvious that the strong, cohesive leadership which characterized the Japanese retreat thus far was beginning to break and disorganization was setting in.

Borneo Oil Field Taken

There was no confirmation of repeated Japanese claims that Balikpapan, last Japanese-held oil center on the east coast of Borneo, was under attack by a large American surface force. Today's communique did note continuation of heavy air strikes on Balikpapan gun positions and on Manggar airfield a dozen miles to the north.

Tokyo radio made the unconfirmed claim that an allied cruiser was sunk and another damaged Monday in air attacks off Balikpapan.

Australian forces were in complete occupation of the Miri oil fields on north Borneo. Miri airfield, which fell to the same force several days ago, gives the allies an airbase 50 miles closer to Singapore than Labuan airfield in the Brunei bay area.

In the Halmaheras, royal Australian air force Spitfires destroyed a Japanese torpedo patrol boat and several small craft off Halmahera. There was no confirmation of an enemy report of an allied landing on Ternate island, administrative center of the Moluccas. Ternate is about 10 miles off the west coast of Halmahera.

Wedding Reception Hit By Sunday Dancing Ban

PORTLAND, June 26.—(AP)—City Judge Quillin today pondered a little-used ordinance which prohibits Sunday dancing at wedding receptions—except in a private home.

Police arrested the host of a dance in Neighbors of Woodcraft hall Sunday night for violating the code. The judge, brought up to date on the ordinance by the city attorney, was "inclined to be lenient, since the bridegroom was a soldier on leave."

He imposed a \$10 suspended fine.

REEDSPORT — Frank Boye, who for the past several years has been serving as mail carrier while operating a general passenger and freight boat on Smith river, has announced sale of his boats and business to Lawrence and Chester Neils of Reedsport. The new owners took immediate possession.

Boye recently was involved in extensive OPA hearings, relative to charges on transporting cream cans. He claimed that he had contacted several federal agencies endeavoring to secure a ruling on rates, but had failed to get in touch with the OPA, which was the agency assuming authority.

Boye stated that his decision to dispose of his business resulted from inability to secure labor and because of reduced profits resulting from OPA regulations.
