4-H Summer School Routine is Noted

The eleven hundred boys and girls at 4-H summer school are now settled in their halls and houses to spend the rest of summer school ending June 29.

Each house and hall has chosen its officers, consisting of president, vice-president, sports manager and song leader. Evelyn Hunter from Douglas county was chosen sports director of West hall.

From 8 o'clock to noon, 4-H boys and girls are proudly walking on the campus to classes. After lunch, county meetings, assemblies and recreation are the main schedule. After supper is the evening entertainment.

Afternoon sports include softball volleyball and swimming. Each house or living group has teams that have been formed into leagues. Marjorie Zeller, Douglas county, was pitcher for the Kappa Alpha Theta team that defeated the girls in the Kappa Delta house. All girls and boys have the privilege of competing in games. League championship will be played in both volleyball and soft ball for girls and boys.

Radio broadcasts on summer school happenings are put on the air over KOAC each day. From 2 to 3 p. m. daily the general assemblies are broadcast. Each evening from 7:30 to 8 p. m. the various counties put on a program on summer school studies and 4-H work in the counties. Douglas county will have its program Wednesday evening, June 27.

The weekly 4-H club program over station KRNR on June 28 will give a more complete program of activities being carried on at the summer school.

Sunday church service for all 4-H summer school members was held in the men's gym from 11:30 to 12:30. A chorus composed of 4-H club girls sang several hymns. Two Douglas county girls, Joyce Sheffield of Sutherlin and Olive Lewis, C. V. Route, were two of the chorus members.

All Douglas county boys and girls will return to their homes Friday, June 29.

Eskimo Killer of Child Sentenced to Be Hanged

SEATTLE, June 27. (AP)—Nome-born Joe Bill, 33, Eskimo,

today was sentenced to be hanged at state's prison September 7 for the rape-slashing of 5-year-old Irma Irene McGough April 22.

Neither his wife nor the family of his victim were in court.

The McGoughs had come here from Portland shortly before the tragedy and were living temporarily at the St. Vincent de Paul salvage depot apartments. Bill was employed at the depot. The little girl's violated body was found hidden in a storage bin and Bill, in hiding several days, surrendered during a widespread hunt. He was convicted June 7.

WASHINGTON, June 26. (AP)—Faced with the greatest transportation crisis in the country's history, the government today put in a rush order for construction of new trains.

Chief J. Monroe Johnson orders 1200 troop sleeping cars and 1200 troop kitchen cars for early next year when troops move.
