### Suicide Attack on Bunker Hill, U. S. Carrier, Among War Experiences of Marine First Lieut. Fred E. Briggs

YONTAN AIRFIELD, Okinawa—(Delayed)—Life has had some odd moments for Marine First Lieutenant Fred E. Briggs of Roseburg, Ore., one of the survivors of the Jap suicide attack on the aircraft carrier USS Bunker Hill May 11.

The flattop's pilots, who were in the air when the ship was knocked out by suicide planes, came here before reporting to a rear base.

It was the first time Briggs had been on Okinawa, but he had been over the island before. In fact, he had his most exciting moments on a raid here March 1, a month before marines and soldiers hit its beaches. That day he was on a bombing and strafing mission and destroyed two Jap aircraft parked on this airfield. But his plane was hit and he had to bail out.

He was not injured by the ack-ack and floated easily into the sea, where he was picked up by a destroyer. A wing was shot off his plane.

On the morning the Bunker Hill was damaged, Briggs was in a unit which had gone out on the dawn patrol. When he returned he saw the crippled ship, some of its survivors bobbing around in the water.

"We were angry, yet helpless because the damage had been done," he said. Pilots dropped life rafts and dye markers around survivors so that ships speeding to the scene could rescue them. Some circled overhead furnishing protection in the event the enemy attempted to return.

Briggs set his plane down on another carrier for a night and then flew with his squadron, the "Fighting Falcons," to Yontan airfield, one of the bases used by the Second Marine Air Wing.

Briggs is the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Briggs of Monmouth, Ore. His wife, Charabell, lives with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Berg, in Roseburg. He was commissioned Sept. 1, 1943, and left the United States Jan. 24, 1944. He attended Oregon State college, and played football and was on the track team at Seaside Union High school.

Briggs' squadron previously participated in numerous carrier-based fighter sweeps over Japan.
