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5¢ OF TASTY DRINKS  
PARADISE ASSORTED FLAVORS  
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5 Cups Ground Berries (Any Variety)  
8½ Cups Sugar  
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, stem, grind 3 quarts fully ripe berries, or crush completely a layer of a time so each berry is reduced to pulp. Measure exactly 5 level cups crushed berries (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary), into large kettle. Add M.C.P. Pectin, stir well and bring to a boil. (Previously measured), mix well and bring to full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 minutes. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing ½ in. space for sealing with fresh paraffin. (NOTE: For Strawberry Jam, add ¼ cup lemon juice to each 5 cups crushed berries.)
