Victory Garden Irrigation Advice Offered Growers

Various methods of irrigating victory gardens are suggested by County Agent, J. Roland Parker, the best one depending upon garden conditions or available equipment. Most Douglas county vegetable gardens will require some irrigation for best results, Mr. Parker says, with a thorough wetting about once a week being recommended during the dry season.

Sprinkling with a sprinkler set up in the garden is probably the most popular method because it is easier to apply water in this way. Some gardeners using this method set a straight-sided pan under the sprinkler and consider the plot adequately watered when the pan is filled to a depth of an inch or a little more.

Other gardeners with reasonably level or only slightly sloping ground favor digging a furrow alongside the rows and letting water run down the irrigation rills. Still others use the so-called soil soaker or porous canvas hose which allows the water to ooze

out and soak into the soil. The soil soaker has many advantages if it is watched and moved to another location when the soil becomes wet to a depth of 6 inches or a little more.

Forus sacks tied over the end of an open hose are used by some in small gardens to spread the water between the rows. This prevents washing of the soil by the force of the water, but frequent moving is necessary.

Mr. Parker points out that gardens planted in a dry soil will require application of a mist-type of irrigation probably every day until the seeds sprout through the ground. This mist spray is needed to moisten the top soil to prevent it from forming a crust. On very dry soils and in very hot weather this mist type of irrigation may be necessary twice daily until the seeds sprout.

PROTECT YOUR INCOME.

There is a little easy money these days, and even the farmer can get in on some of it. For instance, if you don't have one of these new-fangled milking machines, you can work in the meadow all day, then sit down on a comfortable stool late at night and milk the dairy herd. The money you make while lolling on this little stool is really easy money.

So far this year, pastures have been about the best we have seen in years. And also the biggest hay crop. So it looks like Old Bossy isn't going to go hungry. The hay is not only big, but it's getting into the hay and barn in excellent condition.

BUT, comes now the sad part. June is going down in history as the driest June for years. Pastures are drying up fast. With dryer feed, you will have to watch closer as to balanced rations. Vitamins are not so plentiful in dry grass or hay as in fast growing green pastures.

Don't wait too long. After the milk flow has started back, you will find it more expensive to bring it back than it is to keep it up to profitable levels. If you are feeding milk, increase it as necessary, and if you haven't started yet, don't lose any time in starting.

Umpqua Milk is reasonable in price, only \$2.90 per hundred. Starting Monday, Uncle will pay a subsidy of 13c per lb. on butterfat, which with the regular price will bring your returns to about 66c. Remember when we sold butterfat for 13c? Well, now it brings five times that much. Pshaw, pshaw! Better feed the cow. Sure!

DAB.

We still have a few lars of that handy patching stuff they call DAB. Just stir it up and paint it on leaky troughs, pots,

pans, etc., and they will hold water again. It is inexpensive, and easy to use, as well as effective.

We have known some cases where stuff used to make troughs water tight has caused death to poultry. DAB has been used, but no bad results have occurred. Drying weather is causing wooden water troughs to spring leaks. It takes time and material to make new ones and even new ones sometimes leak. Get DAB and make them water tight.

SACKS.

We beg you to bring in your good branded sacks. We have decided to continue paying a dime for them. There is no shortage of common grain sacks. You can make arrangements any time for empty bags for your harvest.

But due to labor shortages and other war time emergencies, it is getting hard to get printed sacks. So you will be doing yourself and the Mill both a good turn, if you turn in what Umpqua branded sacks you may have on hand. This is really urgent.

DON'T HOARD.

The best way to create a shortage of anything is for a lot of people to start hoarding it. Take cigarettes, for instance. Only you can't take cigarettes; they're under the counter.

We don't want a feed shortage. We don't want you to hoard feed. If it is kept too long it loses part of its value. The reason Umpqua feeds are better is because they are absolutely fresh. Being fresh they are eaten readily and thereby produce good results.

Just because we have licked Germany, don't think the WAR is over. ODT warns us that the ARMY will start moving across the U. S. A. about August 1st, and will tie up transportation

more or less from then on. With the ARMY having first priority, wheat, soybean meal, etc., will just have to wait its turn.

So just to keep from being caught short for too long a time, let us again suggest that you try to keep about two or three weeks supply of feed on hand at all times. Store it in as cool a place as you can, and ALWAYS USE "THE OLDEST FEED FIRST." Feed three or four weeks old and will still be good. In fact, most of the feed used in Douglas County, with the exception of Umpqua and Sunrise feed, is that old. So, don't hoard, but don't get too close to shore either.

DO YOU LIKE SHADE?

We will more than likely see plenty of hot weather during the next couple months. Remembering how well you like to lie in the shade, why not fix up a little shade for the growing pullets and turkeys? They not only enjoy it, but will develop much better if not forced to spend too much time in the hot sun. May also save some mortality and prevent some bad habits. It is especially important to keep the drinking troughs in shade if possible. Water and Umpqua feed make turkeys. They will grow more if they eat more; eat more if they drink more; and drink more if the water is cool and convenient.
