Rice Brothers of Dillard Unite War Service With Music and Baseball



Sgt. Vic Rice, of the army, and his brother, Fireman Second Class Hoy Rice, of the navy, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Abner Rice, Dillard, are both "playing" in their respective branches of the military services, but there is a wide variance in the type of "play." Vic plays the piano at Douglas, Arizona, air field and Hoy plays baseball with the navy personnel team at Norfolk, Va.

Vic, a graduate of Roseburg High school with the class of 1934, returned last November after 331 months in the South Pacific, having seen much combat action in the Solomon's. Prior to his enlistment he played piano with several "name" bands, including Ted Weems, Jimmie Grier and Abe Lyman. While in training at March field, he organized and directed the first dance band at that air base.

Now stationed at Douglas air base he spends nearly all of his free time at the recreation center and service clubs, entertaining trainees with his piano music.

"When you see these boys getting ready to go overseas and know that they're probably going to see the things we saw, playing the piano for their entertainment is the least we can do for them," Vic writes.

Hoy Doubles in Baseball
The navy brother, Hoy, started out his career by ranking as top marksman among 60,000 recruits at Farragut, where he received his boot training. He was then slowed down by an operation, but since reaching Norfolk has been getting back in stride.

He was assigned to first base on the personnel team, but in a tough game, when all of the regular pitchers failed to stop the opposing nine, Rice was shoved into the box, "scared to death" according to his own admission. But, despite the fact he was pitching for the first time in anything except a "sandlot" game, he stopped the opposing team's rally, and hurled his own team to victory. Since that time he has been the No. 1 man on the pitching staff.

Hoy graduated from Roseburg High school with the class of 1931 and entered naval training in May 1943.

Lamb Problem Not Met by New Rules Dealer Declares

PORTLAND, June 29—(AP)—Although the new order giving regional OPA officials power to regulate lamb slaughter quotas will help, it does not solve the problem, a livestock industry spokesman said here.

R. L. Clark, president of the Bodine and Clark Livestock commission company, said the ruling was "fine, as far as it goes—but is it enough?"

"We have to market 5,000 lambs a month for the next 90 days," he said. "The federally inspected plants were able to kill 14,000 lambs a month last year and the uninspected plants (affected by the new order) only 3,500."

WASHINGTON, June 29—(AP)—An early increase in ceiling prices for fed lambs and wethers was predicted today by senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.).

He told reporters that while he did not know the exact terms of recommendations which he expects to be made by the OPA, they probably will include an increase of about \$2.50 per hundredweight, together with elimination of the present 95 cent subsidy which is paid packers.
