Schwellenbach Mum on Labor Department Plans

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(AP)—Judge Lewis B. Schwellenbach, the new secretary, said today he preferred not to discuss his plans for administering the labor department until after he had taken the oath and conferred with the bureau heads.

He explained that when he was quoted as saying he intended to run the labor department like a court, because of his judicial experience since Dec., 1940, that he meant he would "sit back and call the shots as I see them."

"Being a judge, I was able to enjoy a simple existence without pressure and to consider the law in every case, then reach a decision. I expect to do about the same in running the labor department."

The walkout at the Goodyear Tire & Rubber company plants in Akron was felt in the company's Lincoln, Neb., factory, which closed because of a lack of parts, giving 1,000 employees a week's vacation without pay. A company spokesman said that production of self-sealing aircraft gasoline tanks was far enough ahead of schedule to take up the loss of one week.

Detroit's idle — which earlier this week totaled more than 50,000 — dropped rapidly yesterday as thousands of auto workers returned to work, although 22,000 at the Packard Motor company were not to resume their duties until Monday. Strikers in the motor city numbered 1,800, including 1,100 at the Motor Products corporation and 700 AFL members of lumber yards.

There were 8,500 idle at four New Jersey-Pennsylvania plants producing auto parts. At New Brunswick, N. J., 2,500 CIO United Auto Workers struck in a dispute over seniority and 6,000 others staged sympathy walks.

finery in Japan. Previous B-29 blows have knocked out from 32 to 100 per cent of eight other homeland oil facilities.

Shanghai, Borneo Blasted Tokyo reported U. S. mine-sweepers and destroyers prowled waters around Okinawa island, 40 miles closer to Japan than Okinawa. Enemy broadcasters obviously anticipated another invasion.

Members ranging out of the Philippines hit oil storage tanks at Shanghai and dropped 281 tons of explosives on blazing Balikpapan, southeast Borneo oil center where Tokyo has been reporting an imminent invasion for two weeks.

Japanese broadcasters said 41 allied warships and several transports carrying troops and tanks were sailing off Borneo now—nearly double the force previously reported. Cruisers and destroyers were said to be laying down a "furious bombardment" to cover close reconnaissance by small craft.

Gen. MacArthur announced today "light, rapid units" were shelling Borneo's east coast, Australian occupied Beaufort extending their control to 135 miles of the west coast—all oil and rubber land.

Eleven Japanese ships, including a minelayer, were sunk in scattered American air strikes.

Linhai, one of the four new cities won by the Chinese, is about 170 miles south of Shanghai, toward which Nipponese coastal garrisons have been withdrawing in a general abandonment of the east China coast.

Liuchow, strategic crossroads city of southern China, was the major prize whose capture was announced today by Chungking. Week-old fires had burned out the center of the city, former U. S. 14th air force base. Enemy withdrawals in this area have abandoned 200,000 Nipponese in southeast Asia.

Two towns on the Indo-China border, Chungking and Malungchai, were reoccupied by Chinese as Japanese withdrew to the south. More Jap Civilians Yield.

In the Davao area of Mindanao, the first sizable haul of Japanese civilians surrendered to American troops. Associated correspondent Richard Bergholz said 75 Japanese women and children walked into American lines to be interned.

Poorly clothed and hungry but not starving, they were taken in custody by elements of Lt. Col. Lester Wheeler's 34th Infantry regiment, which captured Ki-bang. Only 161 of an estimated 17,000 Japanese civilians in the Davao area have surrendered.

WHEREAS, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in the judgment of the State Forester, a menace to life and property due to conditions tending to cause or allow the rapid spread of fires which might occur or because of the inaccessibility of such areas due to the lack of suitable roads, and WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following areas designated as:

AREA NO. R-1.—All National Forests in Oregon and adjacent areas protected by the United States Forest Service as follows: Adjacent to Umpqua National Forest. Sections 25 to 33 inclusive, T. 23 S., R. 1 W.; Sections 1 to 6 inclusive, 8 to 16 inclusive, 21 to 28 inclusive, and 33 to 36 inclusive, T. 24 S., R. 1 W.; Sections 1, 2, 3, 10, 15 inclusive, 22 to 27 inclusive, and 31 to 36 inclusive, T. 25 S., R. 1 W.; Sections 23 and 24, Sections 25 to 28 inclusive, and 33 to 36 inclusive, T. 26 S., R. 2 W.; Ts 30 and 31 S., R. 2 W.; S1 Section 31, Sections 34 and 35, T. 31 S., R. 3 W.; Sections 19, 25, 33, 35, and 36, T. 32 S., R. 3 W.; W1 Section 6, T. 33 S., R. 2 W.; and N1 and S1 Section 1, T. 33 S., R. 3 W. NOW, THEREFORE, I, Howard C. Belton, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 107,210, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, as amended by Chapter 252, Oregon Laws, 1945, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above-described areas to be unlawful and do hereby close said areas and the same shall be subject to use only upon condition that entrants shall comply with all of the following requirements or
