Visiting and cards were enjoyed during the evening.

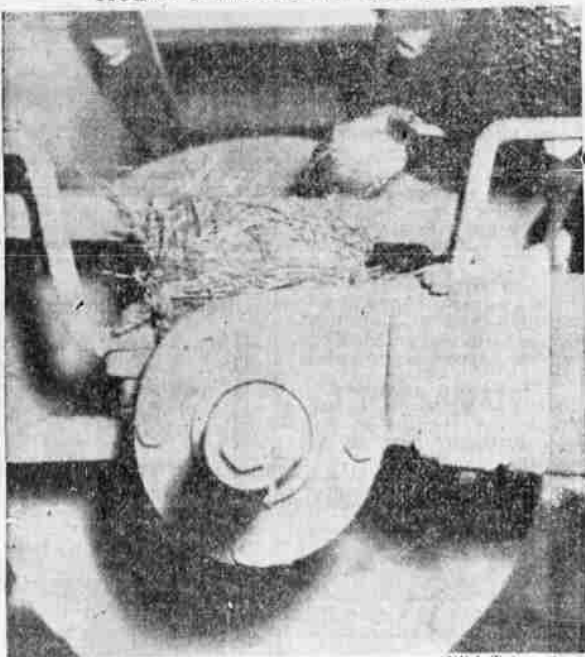

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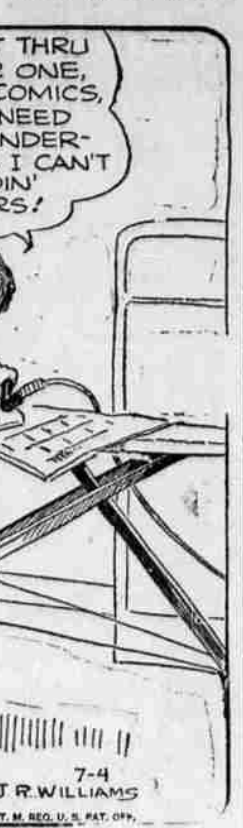

City Building Venture At Reedsport Blocked

REEDSPORT — Local and state police officers stationed in this city have found that the quarters now occupied in the city jail are too small and inconvenient for the operation of their work and City Marshal McCabe recently made recommendation to the city police and five committee that an addition be built to the present jail to afford office space necessary for convenient operation.

The police committee and the council members were favorable to the recommendation and authorized the police department to go ahead with a sketch addition, but several citizens who feel that a substantial building should be erected as a postwar venture, have raised an objection, and while the lumber and cement blocks for the foundation are now on the ground, it is apparent that building at this time will be blocked.

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Shipyard Recruits to Get Transportation Expenses

WASHINGTON, July 3.—(AP)—Skilled workers recruited in middle west and southern states to work at Pacific coast shipyards will be paid their transportation expenses.

A rider amendment, authorizing naval department payment of traveling cost for 15,000 workers, has been approved by the house in a bill now before a senate appropriations committee.

Rear Admiral Crisp told a house committee that "war manpower commissioners have advised the navy the necessary men cannot be supplied without recruiting in midwest and southern states and results will be unsatisfactory unless transportation is paid."

Railway Clerks Slash Time to 6 Days a Week

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2.—(AP)—Decision of clerks at the union railroad station here to work only 8-hour shifts, six days a week, has caused no disruption of services, terminal management said today as the protest action moved into its second day.

The Brotherhood of Railway Clerks, local 1308, voted the regular working schedule in protest of what Membership Chairman William C. Taylor called a "purposeful delay" in signing a contract negotiated some weeks ago with a federal official.

The depot, operated by the Northern Pacific Terminal Co., serves the Northern Pacific, Southern Pacific and Union Pacific railways, which jointly own the terminal company.

Taylor said about 300 of the 400 members have been working a seven-day week. He said the vote would mean loss of 300 man-days a week.

Capt. D. T. Childers on Sunken Jap Prison Ship

Captain Donald T. Childers, former pastor of the First Christian church of Eugene, well known to many Douglas county residents, was one of the prisoners of war aboard the Japanese prison ship sunk Oct. 24 by an American submarine. It is reported at Eugene, the U. S. navy recently captured documents which enabled listing of personnel presumably lost when the prison ship was sunk.

Timed for the Spring, from the Rockies to the Atlantic seaboard, worried farmers searched the skies for signs of clear weather, but the cold rains fell relentlessly.
