## Navy Recruiter is Dated in Roseburg

Navy Recruiter Walter F. Patrie, specialist first class, will be in Roseburg at the chamber of commerce office all day Friday and Saturday morning. Enlistments in the navy for those in the volunteer age groups are still open for men who wish to offer their services. This is in answer to numerous rumors that have been circulating relative to the closing of voluntary enlistments in the naval service, Patrie states. The voluntary age groups comprise those who are seventeen and have not yet reached their eighteenth birthday. Young men in this group are reminded that when coming to the recruiting station to make application they should bring their birth certificates, as the navy accepts nothing less as proof of age. In addition, if a man is desirous of completing his enlistment on that day, he should bring his father or legal guardian who must sign consent forms in the presence of the recruiter. This will save time and trouble for all concerned in the completion of the process of enlistment.

## G. M. Duncan, Prominent Lumberman, Passes

PORTLAND, Ore., July 5.—(AP)—Capt. George M. Duncan, long active in Oregon and Washington lumber circles, died at the veterans hospital here yesterday following a long illness.
