Glendale Drive for Waste Paper On

GLENDAL — The paper drive which was started by I. H. Smith in Glendale is still on. It has been announced. The proceeds from this drive are to be used to defray the expenses for enlargements of pictures of Glendale service men and women.

These enlarged, framed pictures will be placed in the city hall, which will be used as an honorary picture gallery. Everyone in Glendale having relatives in service who enlisted in Glendale are urged to turn in their pictures to the telephone office or to Mrs. Monty Bates.

At the present time the paper accumulated amounts to about 8 tons, which is far short of the 20-ton goal, and everyone is urged to bring in all waste paper, magazines and cartons to the post office where Postmaster Howard Edson, Sr., has charge of it.

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Waste Paper of Douglas Can Make "Suits of Armor"

Residents of Douglas county can supply enough waste paper for 85,760 "suits of armor" for 105 mm. shells if they will buckle down and save an average of 10 pounds of newspapers, wrapping paper and boxes a month. The 105's are the big ones that have been helping American forces in their advance toward Berlin and Tokyo.

Last year Americans saved 1064 pounds of waste paper per capita, or enough for about 35 containers each for the 115 mm. shells.

For each ammunition container or "paper suit of armor" used to protect the shells from salt water, dents, nicks and corrosive dirt, approximately three pounds of waste paper are required, according to W. J. Wardell, vice president of the American Can company, which is manufacturing millions of the containers. Ammunition container board, one of the principal materials used in making the "suits of armor," is made from mixed paper and old corrugated boxes, Mr. Wardell said. Another material used is called "tube and can stock," which is made from all types of waste paper.

Food Issue to be Stressed by GOP

CHICAGO, July 5.—(AP)—The republican party "may well carry" the food problem as the primary issue in the 1946 congressional campaign, says Herbert Brownell, Jr., the party's national committee chairman.

The Truman administration, Brownell told a press conference here, rejected suggestions by republicans for a food "czar" and for changes in the price control act.

"We gave the Truman administration opportunity to take our program of production and distribution of food, which was offered in a friendly spirit," Brownell said, following a meeting of national party officers from 13 midwestern states.

In turning down the republican proposals, Brownell said, the Truman administration "thus has taken the responsibility. Time will tell whether their program will work or whether there will be a continuation of the muddled food situation."

In an address to the chairman and vice chairmen attending the meeting, Brownell asserted that the republican party "still is fighting the new deal" because President Truman "has made that discredited regime his own."

Girl Swimmer Drowns In Columbia River

PORTLAND, ORE., July 5.—(AP)—Drowning of a 15-year-old girl in the Columbia river while swimming with a picnic crowd was the only July fourth fatality reported yesterday.

The girl, Ruth Joan Brandt, Boring, dropped into a deep hole in the river and was pulled down by swift undertow at Crown Point. The body was recovered.
