

Port of Umpqua Now on Cash Basis With Reserve Fund

REEDSPORT — The Port of Umpqua now is on a cash basis, commissioners announced Monday at their regular July meeting. All bills have been paid, it was announced, a reserve fund of \$20,000 for repairs to port, roads, docks and channels has been set up, and a fund of \$5,000 set aside for tug boat repairs or replacements.

Captain Chester Niles, who has had the port's pilot boat "Tiger" under lease for use as an out-side fishing craft, requested release from his contract, under which he has been paying \$150 per month for the use of the vessel, reporting that he has taken over the mail, passenger and freight run on Smith River from Captain Wilson Boye. Boye, in turn, seeks to lease the "Tiger" and negotiation of a new lease was authorized following an inspection release.

Captain Niles requested the commission to deepen the anchorage at the county dock, where mud and refuse have been washed in to such an extent that anchorage is dangerous at low water. The matter was referred to Commissioner Anderson for action. Commissioner Hinesdale reported he had been informed by the U. S. Army Engineers, that a depth of 15 feet of water over the Umpqua bar at low tide now prevails.

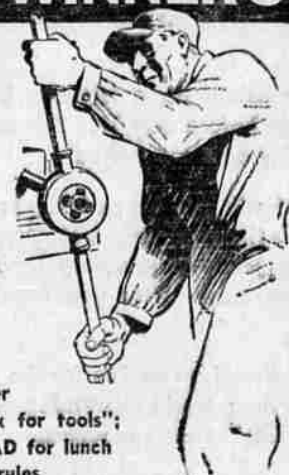
