savages ourselves.

DON'T worry about the toughness of our fighting men. Their record of Jap-killing in the Pacific has left no doubt of that.

THE incident may indicate a further slight spreading of the faint crack that is beginning to appear in the hitherto polished armor of Bushido.

It is not uncommon for the Jap soldier to wear next to his skin a little silk flag on which his mother or his wife or someone close to him has written: "You are going to die for your emperor." He was given that flag as his PAREWELL—for under the savage code of Bushido, he was not expected to come back. If he found his way back he was expected to be ignored, as one who though still walking was DEAD.

Here is a case of Japs being BROUGHT BACK. It may be meaningless. But there it is. Experience teaches us that the savage who is beginning to be shaken in his superstitions is apt to be a MUDDLED SAVAGE.

THE Jap radio says that 250 of our planes (based presumably on Okinawa, or maybe Iwo) made a DOUBLE strike the other day. That is to say, they came over once, went back to their base, refueled and rearmed and CAME OVER AGAIN.

The Japs estimate that 11,000 American planes are now engaged in the attack on Japan.

OUR 5th air force, hitherto based in the Philippines, has been MOVED TO OKINAWA. Thirty-six hours after arrival, it was carrying the war to the Jap homeland.

(We still have plenty of planes left in the Philippines to carry on the job there. In addition, it is probable that British air strength is beginning to arrive in the far south Pacific in considerable strength.)

BALIKPAPAN is today wholly in Australian hands. The Japs, strewing land mines behind them in quite the German manner, are retreating into the oil fields to the northeast of the town, doing all the damage they can while they can.

SOME more statistics: In June, our blockading planes sank 164,800 tons of Jap shipping. Since the first of this year, they have sent 2,282,000 tons of Jap ships to the bottom. That is blockading with a vengeance.

THE senate was investigating committee demands recovery of lend-lease arms from European allies for use in the Pacific against the Japs. It sounds reasonable to us civilians—although there may be some military reason that we non-professionals do not understand.

AT their election Thursday, the British registered a total of 24 million votes out of a possible 30 million. That is 80 per cent. It testifies to the INTEREST in the issues that are up for decision.

An odd sidelight of the election is the fact that many British voters, including Churchill himself, were unable to vote because of the fact that their polling records had been destroyed in the air blitz.

COMMANDER (ex-governor) Stassen says in a talk in Washington: "It is of terrific importance for the people of this country and the world to realize that the mere

Army To Handle Casualty Reports

The Office of War Information, which, since last March 16, has been doing a most excellent job of handling both Army and Navy casualty reports, will, henceforth, list only Navy casualties. The War Department has resumed the task of reporting the Army's casualties.

Separation of the combined lists was decided upon by the War Department after it was informed the Bureau of Budget had ruled that OWI could not perform the service gratis.

Prior to the time OWI took over this task, casualty reports to the press were often from five to six months late. OWI devised a simple, efficient, and speedy method of processing and distribution. In four months it handled more than 450,000, or 44.4 per cent of the total Army and Navy casualties since Pearl Harbor, bringing the lists up to date, so that reports were furnished the press very promptly. This was achieved with a saving in paper of 140 tons, as compared to the slow method used by the Army.

OWI had intended to continue paying for the service, which cost \$125,000 during the period from March 16 to July 1, but the Bureau of the Budget decided that, while OWI could perform the work, the expense would have to be borne by the military services. The War Department, through its bureau of public relations, advised that it would handle its own list. The Navy requested the OWI to continue handling Navy reports.

Since the change was made, this newspaper has been receiving Navy casualties regularly, but we have had no information from the Army.

Unless the Army can show better service than it did before the OWI took over and brought the files up to date, the American public will be greatly discommoded by the change.

Reconstruction of Whipple Mill at Drain is Started

Reconstruction of the Whipple mill at Drain is to be started immediately, following granting of final priorities. It is announced by Jim Whipple, manager. All preliminary work, including ground preparation and foundations, has been completed. The plant will cost from \$50,000 to \$60,000, replacing the mill destroyed by fire several months ago. The mill will be completely new, except for pond, docks, burner and spur track, which were undamaged by the fire.

The new mill will be as nearly fireproof as it is possible to build, the manager reports. Foundations will be of concrete and the plant will be roofed with corrugated iron. It will be electrically operated throughout. Initial construction will include the rough mill with extensions for planers which will be added later.

The plant will measure 32 by 120 feet, with a 22 by 220 foot green chain forming an "L" structure. A subcontract for wiring, fixtures, 200-h.p. headrigs, 37 smaller motors, with a total horsepower of 263 to 250 will be let by the management and is expected to amount to about \$10,000.

J. E. Wilson is chairman of the mill and Donald Davis superintendent. The plant is owned by E. G. Whipple and his son, Jim, the latter serving as general manager.

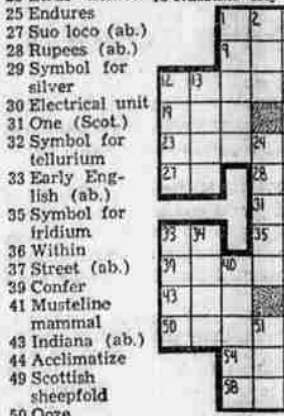

Roseburg Elks Softballers Down Eugene Team, 4-1

The Roseburg Elks softball team defeated the Eugene Jays, 4 to 1 in a tight and exciting game on Friday night Sunday afternoon. The game furnished fans with many thrilling plays and a good duel between two excellent hurlers.

Neither team was able to score in the first four innings and only one hit, a single by Ingram, Roseburg, was chalked up by either team in the four frames.

Eugene filled the bases in the first of the fifth when Baughman, Roseburg catcher, failed to hold a pop fly sent up by Warberg in front of the plate. Warberg was sacrificed to second. Huff walked and Nikkel singled, but fast ball handling held Warberg at third. Battleson and Chausser popped up infield flies for the final outs. With two down in the last of the fifth, Willener drove a hard liner over the head of Mercer in left field and rounded the bases while the ball was run down and returned to the plate, producing for Roseburg the first tally of the ball game.

Game Decided in 7th
Eugene, however, came back to tie the score in the sixth. Christensen singled, but was cut down at second as Willoughby hit a sharp grounder to third. Hartman sacrificed Willoughby to second, and the score came in when Ellison dropped Mercer's fly in short left field.

Roseburg scored three runs in the last of the seventh to win the ball game. Baughman leading off with a single and advancing when Morgan beat out an intended sacrifice bunt. The bases were filled when Ward's hot liner was dropped by Christensen at second. Sanders hit to short left field and Baughman came to the plate after the throw. Hartman, Eugene catcher, dropped the ball as Baughman slid in safely and then threw wild to third in an attempt to catch Morgan, permitting both Morgan and Ward to score on the error.

Beavers, Rainers Add To League Standings

It looks as if the Pacific coast baseball league race will have to be decided in future games between the two leading teams—no other club seems able to chew anything off the fattening percentages of the Portland Beavers and Seattle Rainiers.

Both teams pounded out double header wins yesterday—the city leading Beavers blanked Oakland 6-0 and 7-0 for a 5 and 3 series edge while the Rainiers trimmed Los Angeles 4-1 and 4-0 for a seven out of eight games margin.

Seattle's heavy edge over the Angels paved Portland's league lead to three and one-half games, about the irreducible minimum in this year's race between the two northwest clubs.

Tail-end Hollywood also won both of its Sunday games, beating San Diego 6-3 and 16-5 while San Francisco's slipping Seals split with Sacramento, 7-0 and 1-8.

Dusette Defeats Katonen, Saving Jr. Heavy Crown

Georges Dusette, claimant of the Pacific coast junior heavyweight wrestling championship, snatched victory from the brink of defeat in the final stanza of his titular battle with Paavo Katonen, the rugged Finn, in the main event of the weekly card at the Roseburg armory Saturday night.

In the grip of Katonen's supposedly unbreakable hangman's hold, Dusette, his feet off the mat and with only his chin for a lever, amazed the crowd by somersaulting backward over the Finn's head and then clamping on a full nelson to decide the bout and save his title. The round last 8 minutes, 10 seconds.

It was the full nelson that also subdued the Finn in the quick time of 4:04 in the second round, after Paavo had taken the opener in 15:03 with his hangman.

Olson Beats Lipscomb
Appearing in Roseburg for the first time, Jack Lipscomb, 185 pounds, fully lived up to his reputation for means despite a 10-pound weight pull over his opponent, Milt Olson, in the program starter. After each man had won a fall, Lipscomb was disqualified by Referee Owen for repeated warnings to stop his foul tactics and Olson thereby automatically won the match. This came in 10 minutes, 3 seconds, after Lipscomb had hurled the smaller man through the ropes and onto the floor, and followed up with stuff prohibited in the book of rules.

Olson won the first fall with three successive shoulder butts and a drop kick in 13:25. Lipscomb took the second in 7:34 with a half Boston crab after practically mauling Olson into helplessness.

ODT Now Attending to Farm Transportation
Farmers seeking certificates of war necessity or applications for purchasing new trucks should get in touch with the nearest office of the Office of Defense Transportation or the local rationing board, the county AAA committee advises. The Agricultural Adjustment Agency has been relieved of this war work.

County farm transportation committees have received high praise from ODT for their "valuable assistance" in connection with farm transportation problems during the war. These committees were organized by the AAA in October of 1942 and were terminated June 30, 1945, at ODT's request. "We have neither the authority nor any allocation of funds with which to continue this work," the county AAA committee explains. "So farmers are to receive the same assistance that has been furnished by our office from the ODT offices and the local ration boards."

Surplus Property Buying Available to War Vets

County AAA committees will handle veterans' applications for purchase of surplus property for agricultural purposes under Surplus Property board regulation 7, which became effective July 1. The regulation gives veterans of this war the right to purchase up to \$2,500 worth of surplus property for use in business or agriculture. Purchases under this regulation will be made direct from the Small War Plants corporation. County committees will have full information about the program as soon as procedures can be completed and forms printed.

Vets to Ge Preference In Farm Machinery

Veterans of this war will get preference over nearly all other purchasers of new farm machinery, under a War Food Order recently issued.

To qualify for a "priority" certificate, which county AAA committees will issue, a veteran must be engaged in farming as owner, tenant or share-cropper, and must show both need for and inability to obtain farm machinery to establish or reestablish himself in farming. Dealers are required
