New Speedy Bombers Now Used Against Japanese

STRATFORD, Conn., July 10.—(AP)—Those man-made comets streaking across Japanese skies these days are new Corsair fighter-bombers, amazing planes that can fly faster than seven miles a minutes and carry 2,000 pounds of bombs plus a load of rockets plus the standard armament of six .50 calibre machine guns in their wings. The United Aircraft corporation has been making the new plane—designated F4U-4 and outwardly resembling the familiar Corsair F4U-1—here for some time, and a description of the deadly aircraft was announced last night in Washington by the navy. The F4U-4 already has been in action, and the first Japanese

pilot who ever saw one lived only two minutes thereafter.
