What then is there for us to do but exact unconditional surrender? There is no alternative if we are to have permanent peace.

Announcement by the Public Roads Administration that it is taking over maintenance of the North Umpqua road for the remainder of the dry season ends temporarily the dispute over the condition of that logging route.

The relief, however, is only temporary. PRA probably will return maintenance responsibility to the county court following the first fall rains and it will be the county's duty to keep the road in shape during the winter months.

Before next summer rolls around there should be a definite understanding with regard to the road and its continued upkeep. We should not permit another such dispute.

Considerable resentment has been aroused during the last few weeks. Truck operators are inclined to place all of the blame on the county court.

On the other hand, it obviously is impossible for Douglas county to maintain heavy duty roads without financial aid.

The Public Roads Administration has stepped into the picture for a few months, but we can be sure the same controversy will occur next year unless something is done in the meantime to solve the problem.

It seems unfair to ask Douglas county taxpayers, as a whole, to maintain roads which need excessive expenditures because of commercial use.

Armless, Legless Vet Looks Forward To Active Career

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., July 11.—(AP)—The first and thus far the only battle casualty of this war who has lost parts of both arms and legs is now a patient at Percy Jones General hospital here.

He is Master Sgt. Frederic Hensel of Corbin, Ky., who had both legs above the knees and his left arm above the elbow blown off on Okinawa June 2 when he stepped on a Japanese land mine.

"I'd make a good picture for propaganda against the next war," drawled the good-natured Kentuckian.

His wife, Mrs. Jewell Hensel, now living at Salem, Ind., was on hand to greet him when he came in Sunday night.

Miraculously, military doctors said, Hensel is in good condition. They say he will be able to walk on artificial legs and use his new artificial arms.

In all, there have been 12,500 amputees from the war so far and of these five per cent are "double amps," Gen. Bastion said.
