SAN FRANCISCO, July 11.—(AP)—The dean of Japanese journalists yesterday severely criticized the Nipponese government for failure to tell its people the stark truth about the loss of vital Pacific islands, Tokyo radio reported.

M., July 28, 1945, for all the live and dead timber designated for cutting located on an area embracing about 150 acres within the W1 Section 22, 29 S., R. 1 W., W.M., South Umpqua watershed, Umpqua National Forest, estimated to be 3,862,000 feet B.M., more or less, of Douglas-fir, 20,000 feet B.M., more or less, of western hemlock, 387,000 feet B.M. more or less of California incense cedar, 804,000 feet B.M., more or less of Sugar Pine, 411,000 feet B.M., more or less, of white fir and an unestimated amount of ponderosa pine. No bid for less than \$3.00 per M. feet for Douglas-fir and ponderosa pine, and \$1.75 per M. feet for western hemlock, white fir, and California incense cedar, and \$8.50 per M. feet for sugar pine will be considered. In addition to the prices bid for the stumpage a cooperative deposit of \$0.55 per M. feet B.M. to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash and snag disposal, and cooperative deposit of \$0.25 per M. feet B.M. to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and forest improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$5,000 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale, and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon. Before final award, the high bidder will be required to make a satisfactory showing of financial ability to carry out the agreement. Bids with rates in excess of those permissible under MPR 460 will be reduced to the allowable maximum in making the award.

"Everybody now knows what the loss of Saipan meant to Japan," Tokutomi wrote in the newspaper Mainichi.

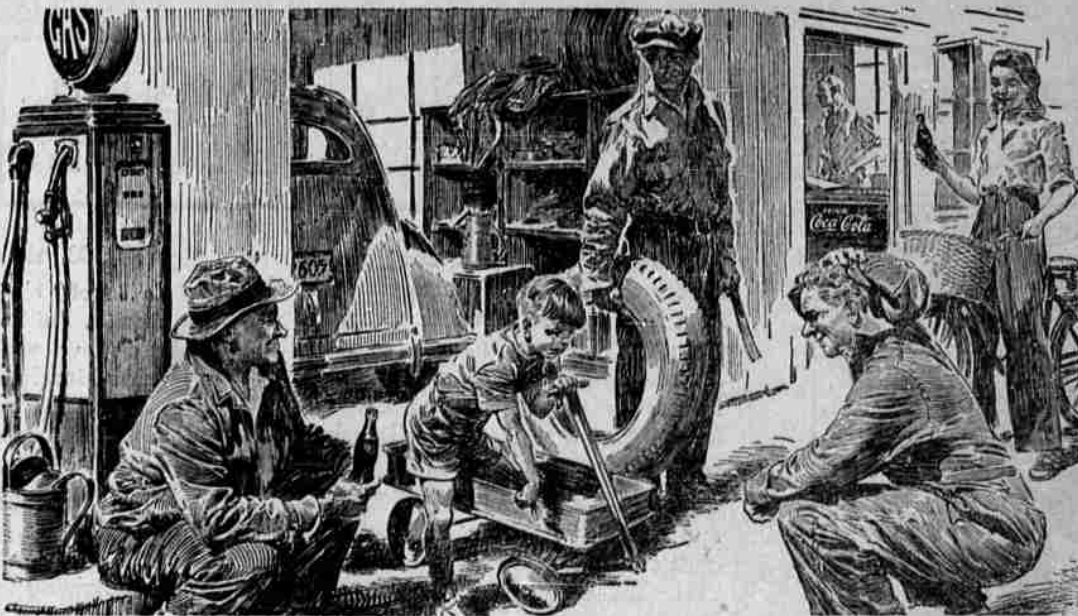
