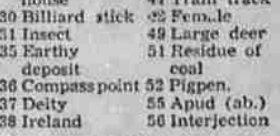

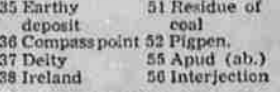
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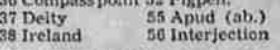
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## Fall Pig Crop Will Fall Short of Goal

Responding to heavy demands for meat and lard, farmers are planning a 1945 fall pig crop of 35.3 million head—a 13 per cent increase over the 1944 fall crop, but almost 5 per cent less than the WFA goal of 37 million.

The USDA crop reporting board points out in its report that "it may well turn out that fall farrowing will exceed the number indicated." The 1945 spring crop is reported as 51.7 million pigs, or about 4 million less than a year earlier. This is nearly 6 million below the goal of 57.5 million. The combined spring and fall pig crop is estimated at 87 million head, compared with 88.5 million head last year and 121.7 million head in 1943. The current meat shortage plus the recent increase in support prices for hogs and the fairly favorable ratio between prices of hogs and feed are factors which would be expected to encourage a further increase in the fall pig crop. Tending to offset these favorable factors, however, are the difficulty in obtaining brood sows and the uncertainty as to the outcome of the 1945 corn crop.

## Postwar Racial Strife Looms, Publisher Says

PORTLAND, July 12.—(AP)—America faces postwar domestic

strife and disunity which it could not stand, Marshal Field III, publisher said here.

He told interviewers that this country "did not deal adequately with problems of decent housing and full employment after the last war, but went into futile witch-hunts instead. We face similar dangers today."

A member of the American Council on Race Relations, Field warned that racial problems in the northwest will become more difficult in the transition to peace.

Declaring himself concerned about racial prejudice, Field said "too few people have met educated Negroes... those who have received every chance for education are amazing. Some of the educated Negroes I have talked to make me ashamed of myself."
