Canyonville Native, Serving in Wacs, Saves Boy's Life

PORTLAND, Ore., July 12.—Eight-year-old Roland Pemberton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Pemberton, 6360 N. E. 32nd Ave., Portland, probably owes his life to the fast thinking and immediate first-aid of Wac Pvt. Marguerite Robinett of Portland army air base, a native of Canyonville.

On the evening of June 18, Pvt. Robinett was returning to the air base and as her bus stopped on Coleman street, she saw two small boys playing nearby. As she watched, they started across the street. The first boy made it, and as the second started around the bus, a truck bore down striking the younger and knocking him unconscious.

An ambulance was sent for, but Pvt. Robinett soon saw the boy's life was ebbing away in the pool of blood forming rapidly beside his still form. Stepping off the bus, with only one purpose in mind, she pushed through the crowd, stooping down and holding the boy's head, she soon quenched the blood flow by holding her hand against his jugular vein and temple. When the ambulance arrived Roland was rushed to the hospital and, though a transfusion was necessary to save the child's life, had it not been for Pvt. Robinett's hurried first-aid, even the transfusion would have been futile.

Pvt. Robinett was escorted to the air base by the Military Police who had been called to the scene, and telling no one of the incident, was soon continuing with her duties.

But this is only the first of the story.

Deed Evokes Praise
Mr. Robert Pemberton, a World War I veteran, and American Legionnaire, spoke to the Legion of Pvt. Robinett's life saving gesture and of his gratefulness. Truman T. Smith, commander of Columbia Power post, 120, wrote to Pvt. Robinett and Col. Charles M. Young, commanding officer, praising and commending her on behalf of the post for her act of Good-Samaritanism. But for her presence and alertness, young Roland could have died in the street that fateful day. Wac Robinett has visited Roland in the hospital several times since the accident, and the two have become the best of pals.

Pvt. Marguerite Robinett is a native Oregonian, having been born in Canyonville, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Pickett. Mr. Pickett now resides at Azalia. Her mother is deceased. Pvt. Robinett enlisted in the Wacs July 21, 1944. She has two sons in the service, Joe H. and Jimmy Jenks, both seamen in the navy, overseas. She is now assigned to duty with Squadron W, at Portland army air base.

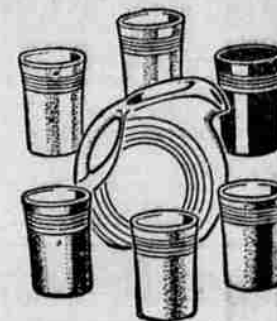

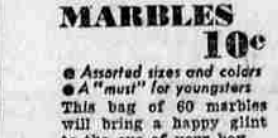
