

Weird Truce Makes Friendly Foes On Isle Off Okinawa

OKINAWA, July 12.—(AP)—A weird truce has been arranged with a Japanese major commanding a garrison on an island off Okinawa whereby he permits Americans to swim and hunt shells on the beach but refuses to surrender "as long as there are no orders from the emperor or his representative."

The truce negotiations with the Japanese commander, who shall be known in this account as Maj. Watanabe, started June 13 when an LCI broadcast an appeal to the island garrison to surrender. Giving the word to the Japanese were Lt. (j.g.) Henry C. Norton and Lt. (j.g.) D. L. Osborn, Japanese language officers, and two captured Japanese officers (known in this account as Lt. Abe and Lt. Nomura).

Lt. Osborn volunteered and swam ashore, planting three white flags with instructions that one flag was to be left standing if no negotiations were wanted and two left standing if a personal interview was desired.

2 Flags Fly at First
Next day two flags were flying. The Japanese commander sent a sergeant to meet one of the captured Japanese officers on the beach.

The sergeant was told that one of Watanabe's Japanese military academy classmates was wounded and held as prisoner.

Watanabe agreed to talk with his wounded classmate.

The Americans returned June 26 bearing the wounded officer, known in this account as Maj. Kikakatsu, on a stretcher.

Watanabe arrived in full dress uniform to meet Lt. Col. George A. Clark of Galeson, Pa., a marine officer commanding a nearby island. At the conference, through interpreters, Col. Clark emphasized that Watanabe and his staff could help rebuild a peaceful Japan if they chose to live rather than die by suicide or starvation.

Watanabe Changes Mind
As a gesture of good faith, Osborn and Norton accompanied the Japanese garrison commander to his headquarters unarmed.

Amably enough, Maj. Watanabe signed their short snorter bills.

After lunch, the Americans returned to the beach.

Next day a messenger appeared at the beach to report that Watanabe had decided not to surrender without word from the emperor.

A yellow memorandum signed by the Japanese commander told Col. Clark:

"We will refrain from harming any parties engaged in non-military pursuits such as swimming, picnicking and shell gathering on the shores of the island."

He also expressed thanks to Clark "and everyone in your party for your friendliness and warm heartedness."
