

30,000 Army Trucks Will be Released

The army will release 30,000 trucks by August 1 to the Department of Commerce—13,000 light and 20,000 medium trucks—as a result of a survey made in an effort to provide some relief for urgent civilian need for trucks.

WFA had requested the War Department to release as many light and medium trucks as possible without jeopardizing the war effort to help meet agricultural requirements. The army is continuing the survey to determine how many more trucks are in excess of requirements and can be declared surplus. Under the surplus disposal regulations, it is possible, when impairment of farm production is threatened, to earmark a reasonable proportion of the surplus trucks for agricultural use and allocate them to areas where the need is most urgent. WFA certifies specific needs to the Surplus Property board which may direct the Department of Commerce to sell specified trucks to dealers who serve the needy areas and who agree to sell only to persons holding certificates from county AAA committees.

U. S. War Casualties Are Heavily Increased

WASHINGTON, July 12—(AP)—A heavy increase in casualties reported by the navy today raised losses of the armed forces since the beginning of the war to 1,049,104. This was 12,167 more than reported a week ago.

The navy, listing total casualties of 133,386, accounted for 7,846 of the week's increase. The army total on the basis of names received here through July 7, was 915,718—a rise of 4,321.

Invasion Jitters Beset Homeland of Japan

undoubtedly will be the prelude to the decisive battle on the homeland.

"Without being able to resist (this air) challenge, we cannot annihilate the enemy on the homeland."

Previous enemy broadcasts had emphasized to the Japanese that American air mastery did not necessarily assure a successful invasion.

Jap Sneakers Blain
A heavily-armed Japanese platoon was wiped out in a two-hour battle with alert American troops today after sneaking within 200 yards of American 24th corps headquarters in the first organized attack since the Okinawa campaign officially ended.

In the fight 24 of the enemy were killed. It was not known if any escaped.

A number of other Nipponese had been killed nearby recently, one after running through the American camp tossing grenades.

Sabang Island Bombed
The enemy's Dornier news agency said 210 British carrier planes bombed Sabang island, in the Indian ocean off the northern tip of Sumatra, yesterday in support of a contemplated landing on Car Nicobar island. Car Nicobar is within fighter range of Sumatra and the Malay peninsula, where amphibious forces might land for a drive on Singa-

pore, greatest pre-war naval base in the Pacific.

Two troop convoys attempting to carry troops from Shanghai to the homeland, possibly to reinforce garrisons guarding the invasion coasts of Japan, were broken up by the American naval air blockade.

On the south China coast, however, the Chinese high command admitted Nipponese troops have recaptured Tsinak in an apparent attempt to strengthen overland communications between Canton and Hainan island. Tsinak is a highway town on the northeastern corner of Luchow peninsula 170 miles southeast of Canton.

Seesaw Fighting

Japanese counterattacks on the Indo-China border were reported beaten back. North of the border, Chinese forces drove from the recaptured U. S. Luchow air base toward Kweilin, 32 miles distant and most important of the lost American air bases in south China.

Isolated Japanese in rainswept south Burma were reported digging in near Nyaungkashe and to have occupied the town which British troops evacuated two days ago in the face of Nipponese attacks.

Australians captured an air field near Balikpapan. Dutch fliers will use the airdrome, the third captured in the 12-day-old invasion of southeast Borneo. Aussies drove a three-mile wedge into defense lines in one sector and broke up a counterattack in another.
