## Oregon, 105.5 Pct., 14th in 7th War Loan Buying

WASHINGTON, July 14.—(AP)—The treasury gave the final standings of the states in percentage of E bond sales as compared with quotas in the 7th war loan.

Eighteen states failed to reach their quotas, but the nation as a whole made 99.4 per cent of its \$4,000,000,000 goal. Hawaii sold a larger percentage than any state, with 130.6 per cent of its \$23,500,000 quota. The Canal zone, with a smaller quota of \$2,000,000 was even higher—160.7 per cent.

Montana led all the states with 119.9 per cent of its \$16,000,000 quota. Oregon stood fourteenth with 105.5 per cent and Washington thirty-seventh with 93.3.

## Oregon Law Code Head to Eye Statues of 2 States

SALEM, Ore., July 14.—(AP)—The legislative interim committee to study revision of Oregon laws announced yesterday it will send Bryan Goodenough, state code commissioner, to Kentucky and Wisconsin to study the code systems of those states. Goodenough said Kentucky and Wisconsin are recognized as having the best code systems in the nation.

Oregon's code has not been revised since it was compiled in 1882. The interim committee will report to the 1947 legislature, and will recommend elimination of many laws and a new compilation of others.

## Lt. Col. M. W. Bell Takes Interesting Airplane Jaunt

Lt. Col. Maynard W. Bell, former News-Review sports editor, now stationed in Italy, writes that he has been seeing many interesting places in southern Europe.

He recently flew to Paris for a weekend with his brother, Lt. Col. Raymond Bell, who is in charge of air disarmament, dealing with collection and disposition of captured aircraft, supplies and equipment.

"I recently made a visit also to the tiny republic of San Marino, just a few miles from here (Fano, Italy)," Bell writes. "The capital city is perched on the summit and precipitous sides, rocky Mt. Titanus, about 2,500 feet up in the clear, blue sky, and is a most unusual and picturesque spot and a mecca for visitors from all over the world during peacetime."

## Cow Creek Reserve To Open for Bow And Arrow Hunting

Hunting for deer with bow and arrow will be permitted in Douglas county during the forthcoming season, that section of the Cow Creek reserve located east and north of Canyon creek having been opened by the game commission exclusively for archers.

Game laws announced by the commission, following the meeting in Portland last week, also permit hunters to take whitetail deer in Douglas county.

For the entire state, the commission set an open season on blacktail and mule deer from September 29 through October 28, with the bag limit remaining the same as last year—one deer with not less than forked horns.

## Reserves Opened

Game reserves open to hunting follow: Salt creek, Mule Deer, Mount Emilly, Myrtle park, Steens mountain, Cow creek, Whitetail Deer, Grass mountain, Ochoco, that part of Warner reserve outside of federal Hart Mount, Antelope reserve and Canyon Creek game reserve; provided that that part of Canyon Creek refuge east and north of Canyon Creek is reserved to bow and arrow hunting.

The commission voted a special season on does in an area of 1000 square miles in central Oregon's Fort Rock district, the season to run from Decem-

ber 1 through December 5, and an elk season from November 3 through November 25, except that no elk may be killed in the coast counties. The eastern end of Lane county is exempt from the rule.

**Open Season On Fowl**  
Open seasons set on wild fowl as they apply to Douglas county are October 13 to 28 for pheasants, sooty or blue grouse and California or valley quail.

The open season on ducks, geese and other migratory waterfowl will be from October 13 until February 1, unless the federal government takes action to close the season earlier.

For the first time in ten years, there will be an open season of marten, a fur bearing animal which has increased from only a scattered few to an estimated 10,000. The open season on these animals will be from December 15, 1945 to February 15, 1946. Present market price of marten pelts is around \$35.

## Two More Nazi Prisoners Are Hanged for Murder

PT. LEAVENWORTH, Kan., July 14.—(AP)—Two more German prisoners of war, the second group to be hanged at the U. S. disciplinary barracks in less than a week, went to their deaths shortly after midnight for the murder of a fellow prisoner at Alden, S. C.

Near collapse and showing signs of nervousness, the two Germans—Rudolph Straub and Erich Gauss—were hanged for the murder April 5, 1944, of Horst Guenther in a work camp.

The army account of the slaying said Guenther was charged by his fellow prisoners with being a "traitor to his oath, flag and fatherland." A kitchen orderly, he also was accused of dividing milk unfairly between German prisoners and Americans, with having reported other prisoners to American officers for taking too much food and for revealing a threatened strike.

## Better Food Supply Is Forecast by Ellsworth

PORTLAND, July 14.—(AP)—The nation can "confidently" expect a better food supply by fall under the direction of Secretary of Agriculture Anderson, Rep. Ellsworth declared here.

The congressman, ready for two weeks' vacation "off the beaten track," called Anderson "a good man with a good knowledge of the food situation."

He expressed concern over Oregon's lamb marketing problem. "The solution, of course," he said, "is to take lamb off rationing here until the over-supply is used up."

Ellsworth predicted a much larger appropriation next year for regional wood products research. After his vacation, he plans to tour the seven southwest Oregon counties which comprise his district.

Patrolling down a river bed, the platoon encountered the enemy stronghold with its guns set up for action.

Encircling the position to cut the Japs off from their weapons, they eliminated the hostile force and captured the five heavy machine guns, knee-mortars and ammunition in the area.
