Sutherland Places Order For Fire Equipment

SUTHERLIN — At a meeting of the Sutherland Volunteer Fire department, attended by the mayor, Elmer Cooper, and a committee appointed by the council, an order was placed for a Dodge two-ton truck chassis. Equipment which includes a 550-gallon tank, will be made and placed on the truck by Howard Cooper corporation of Portland. It will take about sixty days for making the fire apparatus and delivery cannot be expected before then. Funds amounting to \$5,000 had been set aside for fire fighting equipment by the city council two months ago.

The new equipment will increase pressure of water taken from hydrants, can be used as a pump from ponds, and will carry a 550-gallon tank of water under pressure which will enable firemen to check fires immediately upon arrival.

Labor-Industry Teamwork Urged By Schwellenbach

WASHINGTON, July 14—(AP)—Labor and management jointly share the responsibility of averting industrial strife, says the new Secretary of Labor, Lewis Schwellenbach.

In a radio address last night Schwellenbach told labor that for its part it should abide by the no-strike pledge.

Management on the other hand, he said, should avoid those things "which provoke men and tempt them to act first and reason later."

Likewise, he declared, the two groups must shoulder equal responsibility in developing what he termed a postwar economy of plenty with a "strong consuming power."

If that goal is to be reached, he said, "short-sighted" management should not seize upon the chance "to reduce wages and smash the unions."

The government's job, he added, will be to provide machinery for the peaceful settlement of labor disputes and to set at rest "fear" among the workers that they will lose their jobs once the war ends.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in my judgment, a menace to life and property on account of the high fire hazard caused by an excessive number of snags and inflammable debris on the ground due to logging operations and old burns, and

WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester, it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following area designated as:

AREAS No. 8-P—COOS COUNTY FIRE PATROL ASSOCIATION AREA:

Township 22 South, Range 9 West: Secs. 19 to 36, inc.

Township 23 South, Range 9 West: Secs. 1 to 18 and 21 to 36, inc.

Township 24 South, Range 9 West: All of township.

Township 25 South, Range 9 West: All of township.

Township 26 South, Range 9 West: All of township.

Township 27 South, Range 9 West: All of township.

Township 28 South, Range 9 West: All of township, except the Coos Bay Wagon Road, the East Fork of the Coquille River, and that area between.

Township 29 South, Range 9 West: All of that portion of the township lying north of the State Highway right of way, and all

of that portion of the township lying south of the Middle Fork of the Coquille River.

Township 30 South, Range 9 West: All of that portion of the township lying north of the State Highway right of way, and all of that portion of the township lying south of the Middle Fork of the Coquille River.

Township 31 South, Range 9 West: All of township.

Township 22 South, Range 10 West: All of that portion of the township lying south of the Umpqua State Highway with the exception of the Mill Creek Road.

Township 23 South, Range 10 West: Secs. 2 to 11, 14 to 23, 26 to 36, inc., with the exception of the Loon Lake-Allegany County Road and Mill Creek Road.

Township 24 South, Range 10 West: All of township with the exception of the Loon Lake-Allegany County Road, and that area in the Golden and Silver Falls State Park.

Township 25 South, Range 10 West: All of township.

Township 26 South, Range 10 West: All of township.

Township 27 South, Range 10 West: All of township.

Township 28 South, Range 10 West: Secs. 1 to 4, inc., Sec. 7, S. 8, Sec. 8, and Secs. 13 to 36, inc.

Township 29 South, Range 10 West: Secs. 1 to 14, 16 to 21, 23 to 26, inc., all of that portion of Secs. 29 to 32 lying north of the State Highway right of way and south of the middle Fork of the Coquille River, and Secs. 35 to 36, inc.

Township 30 South, Range 10 West: All of that portion of the township lying north of the State Highway right of way, and all of that portion of the township lying south of the Middle Fork of the Coquille River.

Township 22 South, Range 11 West: That portion of Secs. 1 and 2 lying south of the Umpqua

Highway, and Secs. 4 to 9, and 12 to 36, inc.

Township 23 South, Range 11 West: All of township.

Township 24 South, Range 11 West: Secs. 1 to 18, 21 to 24, and 27 to 29, inc.

Township 25 South, Range 11 West: All of the E. 1/2 of the township.

Township 26 South, Range 11 West: All of the E. 1/2 of the township.

Township 27 South, Range 11 West: All of the E. 1/2 of the township.

Township 28 South, Range 11 West: Secs. 13, 14, 23 to 27, 34 to 36, inc.

Township 29 South, Range 11 West: Secs. 1 to 3, 10 to 15, and 23 to 26, inc.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, HOWARD C. BELTON, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 107-210, Oregon, Compiled Laws Annotated, as amended by Chapter 252, Oregon Laws, 1945, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above described areas to be unlawful and that said areas shall be subject to entry only through permit to be issued by the State Forester, or a fire warden, under which permit entrant shall comply with any and all of the following requirements:

(1) To refrain from smoking

except in places designated as safe in said permit.

(2) To build no open fires except in places designated as safe in said permit.

(3) To have as a part of his or her equipment when using campfires, except when traveling as a pedestrian and/or camping at improved, designated and posted campgrounds tools as specified by the forester suitable for extinguishing fires.

This proclamation shall be effective from and after the 11th day of July, 1945, and shall remain in full force and effect until the 31st day of December, 1945.

Done at the Capitol in Salem, Oregon, this 10th day of July, 1945.

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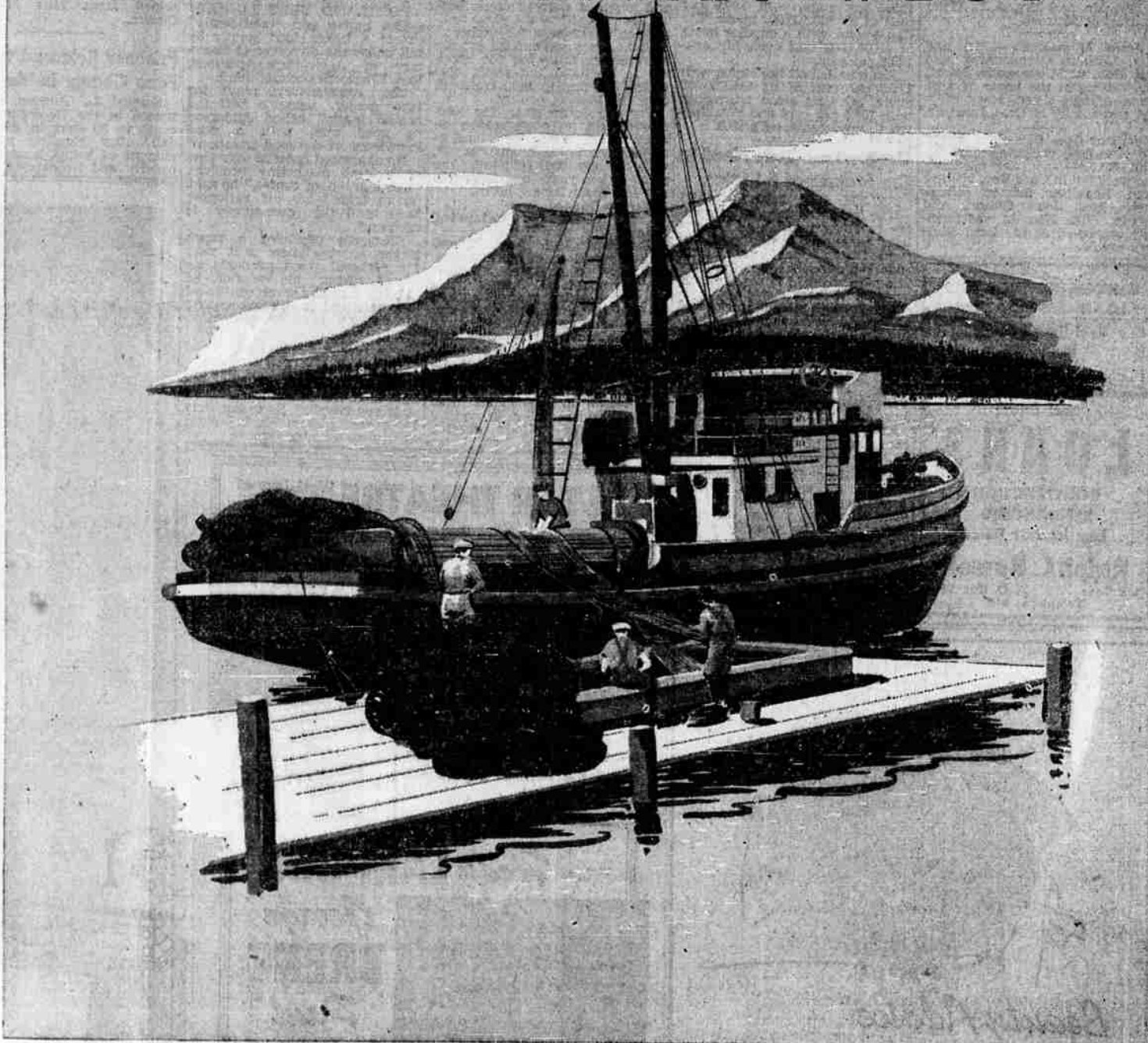
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
