Truman Tours Berlin Ahead of Big 3 Huddle

next April.
Mr. Truman, for his part, was said to see his role not as simply a mediator between two powerful allies, but as a spokesman for a nation which is seeking to arrange a world structure in which its technological leadership and democratic ideals will have a greater play than ever before.
Stalin's Objections Listed
Oldtime foreign dwellers in Moscow say it has seemed that Stalin has held closely to four objectives in directing the state affairs for the huge land mass and nearly 200,000,000 people who make up the soviet union.
His first objective—defeat of soviet enemies in the west—has been achieved. The others are said to be:
1. Defeat of soviet enemies in the east—meaning first of all Japan.
2. Consolidation of the outer defense system for soviet territories, which, with the inclusion of the Carpatho-Ukraine in the soviet Ukraine and the prospective inclusion of the northern half of East Prussia in soviet Lithuania, would extend the Kremlin's dominion farther than was ever reached by the czars.
3. The crystallizing of wartime friendship with the western allies to endure through long years of peace to come, in which at the very least there would be tolerant non-interference by the others in the sphere in which each of the Big Three is to be dominant.
4. Virtually all European problems reported up for discussion in Potsdam bear in some way on the soviet union's outer defenses. One of the most pressing of these, of course, is the future of conquered Germany.
Paul Wandel, chief editor of the German communist publication, Deutsche Volks Zeitung, wrote: "We have no individual party interests any more. All anti-fascist democratic parties are united now and seek permission from all the allies to cooperate in the rebuilding of German life on a new basis. We hope that permission will be forthcoming from Potsdam."
Wandel recently returned to Berlin from exile in Moscow.

Two Japanese Steel Cities Razed by Fleet

Adm. Nimitz reported three cities were hammered by land-based aircraft during the weekend.
Naval guns raved much of Muroran on Hokkaido and Kamakura on Honshu while carrier aircraft burned out the Hokkaido town of Kushiro, promoting Premier Suzuki to urge Japanese to have faith in defense preparations "against enemy landings on our homeland." Heaviest damage was inflicted Sunday on Muroran.
A thousand tons of American shells fired from the super-battleships Missouri, Iowa and Wisconsin, and bombs from supporting aircraft set off a series of explosions and fires in the Nippon steel plant, heavily damaged the Wanshi ironworks, a chemical plant, and other industrial establishments. Fires blazed throughout the industrial and waterfront sections of the city. The smoke may be seen from that before Sunday's bombardment ended, spotter planes were flying only 1,000 feet above the city and still unable to determine accurately the extent of damage.
Japs Offer No Defense
The Japanese made no attempt to retaliate, although the bold task force under Rear Adm. Oscar C. Badger steamed virtually into the harbor with Japanese shores lying on three sides of the bombardment group.
Tokyo reported reconstruction crews were at work repairing the steel producing city of Kamakura, which was wrecked in Saturday's bombardment by another task force under Rear Adm. J. F. Shafter.
Supporting carrier aircraft—Tokyo said there were 1,000 Saturday and 1,500 Sunday—plunged through bad weather to knock out land and sea communications around both cities.
No Targets Remain
Tokyo reported Mustangs were back today, as between 50 and 75 Superforts set off explosions and fires visible for 100 miles in their second high explosive strike on the Kudamatsu oil refinery. No B-29s were lost. Previous Superfort strikes wrecked from 45 to 95 per cent of Nippon's nine other oil centers.
"Japan is virtually destroyed," said General Giles and there are no targets left in Japan worth 1,000 plane raids. He indicated strikes in this force would be hurried against virtually untouched targets on the Asiatic mainland after Lt. Gen. James Doolittle's Eighth air force is established on Okinawa. Doolittle's Superforts will begin arriving on Okinawa in mid-August.
Admiral Nimitz belatedly announced the occupation of Ikiya and Aguni islands in the Okinawa area early in June. They were taken by marines without opposition, only Japanese sent were 156 garrisoning a third tiny island who were so impressed by the bombardment of Ikiya they hurried over and surrendered.
Chinese Regain Bases
Current allied land conquests include growing allied advances on two coastal and two inland sectors of China. Chinese were reported mopping up Kanhsien, sixth former American air base site to be regained, as the main portion of the enemy garrison fled northward from the island city.
In southeast China two of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's columns were reported within 50 and 32 miles of Kweilin, one

Coastal Chinese forces pressed within 117 miles of Shanghai, capturing Chongshien, and on the south coast seized the highway center of Linkong on the Luichow peninsula.

Philippines Toll Upped
Yanks mopping up in the Philippines killed 4,879 Japanese last week and captured 608. Among them were hundreds of Japanese naval labor troops who starved while nearby Japanese army units ate heartily. American casualties last week were 62 killed, one missing, 195 wounded. Total casualties for the Philippine campaign were 428,732 Japanese, mostly dead, and 54,502 American, mostly wounded.

Australian forces drove five miles through southeast Borneo swamps to within five miles of the rich Sambodja oil field against vanishing enemy resistance. Nipponese began pulling out, too, from a brief stand in southern Burma where British cleared out five more villages.

Doesn't Prevent War
The elimination of compulsory military service as a policy of nations, Martin said, "would be the greatest single act of statesmanship that could be accomplished in the immediate present."
"The system which has long been the practice of European nations has never prevented war," the Republican leader said.
"It is always viewed with suspicion and fear by other countries, forcing them to adopt the same policy."
"It becomes an insupportable burden, a constant drain on the people of the world, and a further incentive to war."

Morse Demands Policy On Marketing of Lambs

WASHINGTON, July 16—(AP)—Senator Morse has asked Secretary of Agriculture Anderson to announce a national policy on lamb marketing to halt further production declines.

Morse warned big packers are taking advantage of the unsettled market and that producers will not continue under existing uncertainties.
He said the chief difficulty "is with the OPA, because its top men here in Washington have no intelligent understanding of livestock problems."

War Bond Purchases by Oregon Students Praised

PORTLAND, July 16—(AP)—Oregon students have earned applause from State War Finance Committee Director Kenneth Martin for their record war bond purchases during the past school year.

Martin said school pupils purchased \$9,577,722 in E bonds the year ending June 30 and college students \$1,368,000. He said the moral value of their help was as valuable as money invested.

sons are moving from one city to another," OPA said in announcing that.

These persons may apply for new tires if they have a tire failure while making a permanent change of residence, regardless of the type of ration they hold:

1. War workers moving from one city to another as production shifts from one type of war goods to another and to civilian goods.

2. Members of the armed forces moving to a new port.

3. Discharged veterans returning home or moving to another city to accept a job.

Special Ration Required
Before being eligible to apply, a motorist must have been issued a special gasoline ration for the trip.

"B" and "C" motorists have been eligible for new tires, but not for tires while actually making a change in residence. This is because they had to surrender their supplemental rations in order to receive a special gasoline ration. Technically, this made them "A" drivers, at least until they could reestablish eligibility for supplemental rations in their new home.
