Since the scouts use it only in the daytime, and the service men at night, it works out very nicely.

The Girl Scouts already have a scout library of close to a hundred books, that have been loaned or donated. And are planning a traveling library of 50 books from the statue library, but must have more book shelves first, then will open the library for the whole community.

Some of the work the Scouts have taken up is: Pastel painting and art work, basket making and weaving and other crafts, which have been laid aside now till fall and winter.

At the present time they are interested in outdoor work and play; camping, hikes and swimming. They are to have as swimming instructors, Ardeth and Ardell Childers and Joyce Ady.

The girls are helping with the outdoor crops, caring for children and many other useful things.

They are planning on turning out in uniform soon and many of the girls are earning the money themselves for the uniforms.

The Girl Scouts meet every Wednesday at the city hall at 2 P. M. till school starts then will go back to Saturday afternoon. They hope to make Myrtle Creek a better place by having both boy and girl scouts.

Subsidies to Sheep, Lamb Producers Proposed

WASHINGTON, July 16—(AP) Senator O'Mahoney (D., Wyo.), offered legislation today to provide subsidies to sheep and lamb producers. He said they need help to stay in business.

The bill would permit the Commodity Credit corporation to spend \$50,000 a year so lamb prices to the producer could be raised two and one-half cents a pound.

The RFC now may pay subsidies to lamb packers only.

The senate approved O'Mahoney's idea in an amendment to the second deficiency appropriation bill but the house rejected it.

Two Fined, Third Given 30-Day Jail Sentence

Jack Davis, pleading guilty to a charge of being intoxicated on a public highway, was continued in custody Monday in lieu of payment of a \$25 fine. Justice of the Peace Thomas C. Hartfield reported today. A fine of \$10, on a charge of permitting a non-licensed minor to operate a motor vehicle, was paid by Harvey J. Potts, Judge Hartfield said.

Peter Kroschewski, a Canadian, was sentenced to 30 days in the

county jail on charge of soliciting a ride, but his release was ordered when his status of entry into the United States is cleared with immigration authorities.
