passenger.) It is driven by a motherly woman of 60-odd, attired in a house dress. Another passenger gives her an address and asks casually if she knows how to find it.

She does, too. Not only that, but on arrival she tells him what door of the building to enter to get to the office he wants to go to, and when he disagrees and says no it's another door, she waits until he wanders out with a defeated expression and tells him: "I told you to go to the other door in the first place."

These Washington cab drivers! They've always been individualists of the first water, and now that their ranks are being entered by motherly women in house dresses they're even more so.

THE big issue in Washington at the moment is the FEPC — the Fair Employment Practices Committee, which seeks to make black and white equal in America by law. It is one of those issues that involve a lot of oratory and are more concerned with vote getting than with the practical solution of problems.

There's a lot of justice in the theoretical purposes of the FEPC. Whatever else may be said on the subject, the colored man is certainly entitled to work on a plane of complete equality with the white man. If he has the same skill, the same adaptability and the same degree of application to his job, he should be entitled to the same wages. Common sense and fundamental fairness tell us that in no uncertain words.

But when you try to FORCE such things by law, you run into a lot of human nature.

THE time will undoubtedly come when there will be no discrimination in employment in America because of color. The time may come, in some distant generation, when white and black will mingle without prejudice.

But it's a fairly safe guess that these things won't be brought about by a hard and fast law that says it has to be NOW.

It seems probable, incidentally, that the FEPC will be stalled off instead of settled now. The most likely solution is an appropriation that will enable the controversial committee to drag along for another year without money enough to do much more than barely exist.)

SENATE ratification of the San Francisco charter, which is the big show for next week, is about as near a foregone conclusion as anything can be. The opposition that has been making minor headlines is TOKEN opposition. The vote against it is expected to be negligible.

There is none of the fierce idealism that marked the league of nations fight in the senate. Nobody has any delusions. The charter just looks like something that OUGHT to be given a trial.

Besides, the conviction is strong here that the VOTERS are for it. That always goes a long way in Washington.

WATER SAFETY RULES

Three drownings in as many weeks in the Roseburg area should serve to impress upon our minds the importance of observing water safety rules. These tragic deaths undoubtedly will frighten many parents into denying to their children the natural enjoyment to be afforded by water.

There is an affinity between small boys and running water. It may be a most troublesome task to persuade Junior to wash behind the ears, but, if there is a stream nearby, it is certain he will eventually go wading or swimming, even though it means a woodshed session if he is caught in the act.

Water is dangerous, yet our rivers, lakes and beaches afford us opportunity for unlimited recreation. The danger, however, results principally from failure to observe well-established rules of caution.

In nearly every drowning accident we can recall the source of the tragedy lay in violation of a cardinal rule of water safety. One of the principal causes for water tragedies is the practice of children wading or swimming without a capable swimmer present.

We believe every child should be taught to swim at the earliest possible age. Thereby he has the best insurance against drowning. Today's children have far greater opportunity to learn to swim than did those of us "born thirty years too soon."

In addition to learning to swim, every child should be taught NEVER to go in the water, even to wade, unless a capable swimmer is present. Any swimmer, child or adult, should know his physical limitations and avoid over-exertion.

If a child can be taught to conduct himself properly in the water, he can have all of the enjoyment and recreation which water makes possible with but little danger to himself.

There is a vast difference between caution and fear. Every possible effort should be used to prevent children from becoming afraid of water. But, on the other hand, a spirit of caution must be instilled if we are to avoid accidents of the kind which have saddened our community in recent days.

Battleship Nevada, Often Battered, is Still Top Fighter

WASHINGTON, July 19—(AP)—Veteran of two wars, the battleship Nevada absorbed damage from a flaming suicide plane and five hits from an Okinawa shore battery but stayed in the fight.

The Nevada today told the story of the actions which occurred as the famous old ship was operating as part of a formation assigned to obliterate enemy installations on the island.

Despite her damage, the Nevada was back in action within four hours. The next week, on April 5, while still pounding away at Japanese airfields, shore defenses, supply dumps and suspected troop concentration points, a coastal battery opened fire.

The Nevada, which cracked the toughest installations the Nazis could provide at Normandy, Cherbourg and southern France, struck it out for 18 minutes. During the engagement the enemy fired an estimated 24 shells, five of which registered.

Effective Retaliation Experienced gunners of the Nevada got off 71 rounds from her 14-inch main battery alone, and when the shooting was over, the navy said "the target area resembled a gravel quarry after a weeks blasting."

The Nevada's damage was repaired overnight, and the next morning she was back on the firing line. In the kamikaze attack, the Nevada's anti-aircraft guns assisted in splashing two of the attackers before a "Val" dive bomber streaked out of the haze apparently bent on striking the bridge.
