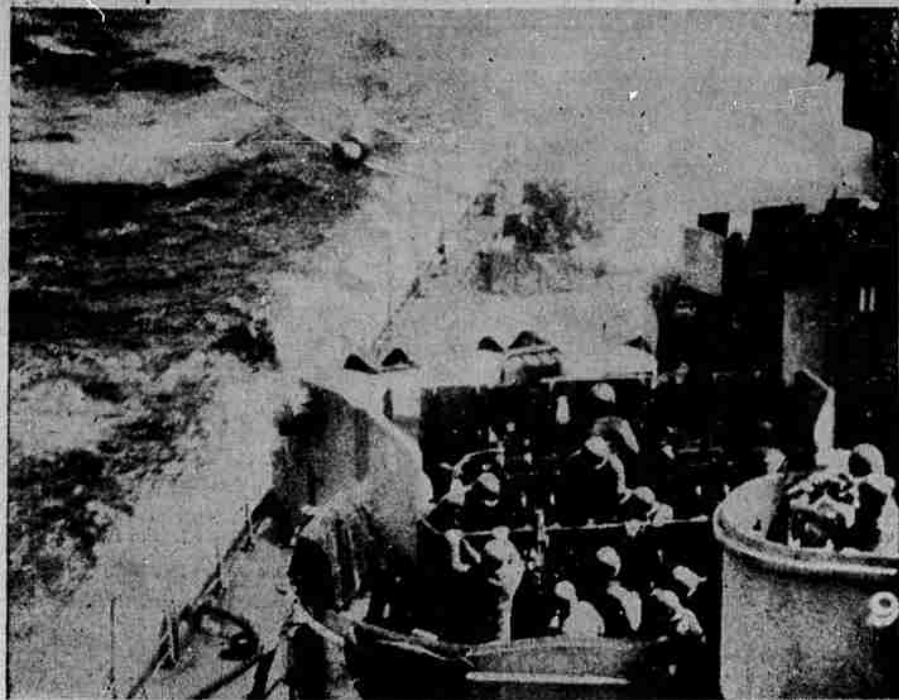
## Optometry College to Transfer to Pacific U.

## Calf Gulps Billfold, but All Contents Recovered

FORSYTH, Mo., July 19—(AP)—Because his calf had an appetite for billfolds, R. F. Soutce, a Toneyville, Mo., farmer, has applied to his ration board for gasoline "A" and "B" book replacements.

Soutce explained to the board he lost his billfold on his farm and later found the calf making a meal of it. He killed the calf and reclaimed the wallet with all its contents, including money, ration books and a lock of his daughter's hair.

Ration officials were able to identify the "A" and "B" books. The lock of hair, wrapped in cellophane, was undamaged.

## Sawmill Strike Threat Involves 60,000 Workers

PORTLAND, July 19—(AP)—The AFL will formally announce July 28 for a strike vote which threatens to send 60,000 workers out of logging camps and sawmills in five states.

Kenneth M. Davis, executive secretary of the AFL Northwest council of Lumber and Sawmill Workers, was authorized by his executive committee to ask the NLRB for the ballot.

The action was taken in support of AFL demands for a flat 20 cents an hour increase in Douglas fir operations, and a \$1.10 minimum in other fir and pine operations.

## Canadian Navy Munitions Explode; 13 Casualties

HALIFAX, N. S., July 19—(AP)—Canadian navy munitions set off by a jetty fire rocketed the Halifax area overnight with four high explosion and a series of

lesser discharges which ended only after dawn today.

Damaging and crippling blasts persisted for more than 13 hours at the depot, in nearby Dartmouth.

There were 13 known casualties, twelve persons were injured and one was missing. The whole civilian population of Dartmouth, approximately 17,000 persons, and others living in the North end of Halifax were evacuated on official orders.

## Franco to Change Whole Spanish Cabinet, Report

MADRID, July 19—(AP)—High government informants said today that Generalissimo Franco would announce a new Spanish cabinet tonight, changing virtually every minister.

It was learned that the slate will include a number of persons known as Don Juan monarchists and civilian spokesmen of the Catholic church of Spain, rather than Falangists.

The new cabinet was said to be designed to bridge what Franco called the "preparative period" between the present regime and the monarchy he has proposed to restore.

## Law Takes Priority Over Lord in Negro's Case

MIAMI, Fla., July 19—(AP)—Charles E. Johnson, negro filling station operator, decided a little fervent praying would be best protection against OPA charges of gasoline rationing violation.

After he had been arraigned before OPA Hearing Commissioner Travis Williams, he clasped his hands and began to invoke divine intervention.

"Just a moment," remonstrated Williams, "I'll try you first, the Lord can try you later."

## Wenatchee Fruit Drying Plant Burns; Loss \$200,000

WENATCHEE, Wash., July 19—(AP)—The Wenatchee plant of the Valley Evaporating company, with an apple drying capacity of 6,000 boxes daily, was completely destroyed by fire early this morning.

Loss was estimated by Harley H. Halauer, manager, at \$200,000. Destroyed in the fire were

three carloads of sugar and 100 tons of apricots, besides all equipment and machinery in the plant, the largest of six owned by the company. Others are located at Oroville, Chelan Falls, Yaldma, Buena and Cowiche.

## Hot Spell Deals Heavy Loss to Oregon Farmers

CORVALLIS, July 19—(AP)—Hot weather cost farmers in Oregon thousands of dollars — with heavy losses in canning peas, cherries, and berries, the state farm labor office said today.

The office said some late wheat and hay cured so fast that farmers in some regions were unable to get it up before it bleached.

Extreme heat drove some volunteer pickers and Mexican farm hands from fields early in the day; and the sun ripened cherries and berries faster than they could be picked. Farmers called for 1000 more hay harvesters.
