need accommodations for 125 to

150 men.

Thomas T. Clark of the Umpqua

Plywood corporation stated his

company needs immediate living

quarters for from 30 to 50

men who will be engaged in con-

struction of the plant at Green,

and will require 100 or more ad-

ditional units when the mill is

put in operation.

W. M. Safely of the Eugene

Plywood corporation stated that

his woods crew is from 15 to 20

hands short because housing fa-

cilities are not available.

Workers Give Up Jobs

Operators agreed that the man-

power shortage could be relieved

immediately if housing accom-

modations were available, as each

reported numerous applications

for work but stated that laborers,

after working for a few days and

finding no suitable living

quarters for their families, would

move to other locations.

It also was agreed that the

pressure could be relieved by pri-

vately financed construction if

building materials were available,

but it was pointed out that many

people, now holding priorities

with which to erect homes, are

not able to find the materials

with which to build. Due to this

situation, it was the consensus

of opinion that the only method

by which immediate relief could

be afforded is to move unused

dwellings from other public hous-

ing projects into the Roseburg

area at the earliest possible date.

Complete Relief Doubtful

In addition to conferring with

operators, Mr. Coplen made a

survey of the entire Roseburg

area.

"I am fully convinced," he de-

clared, "of the imperative need

for additional housing in Rose-

burg. We will do all we can to

help the situation, but I doubt

very much if it will be possible

to secure enough dwelling units

to fully meet Roseburg's needs."

pital will be partially alleviated

by the NHA, city officials said to-

houses would favor rental units

rather than those for owner-

occupancy.

Invasion Fear Ups Jap Troops on China Coast

direction of Shantung.

Shantung is across the Yellow

sea from Korea, and slightly more

than 500 miles west of Japan. It

would afford one of the most

direct approaches to the Nip-

ponese mainland arsenal in Man-

churia, where major continental

battles are expected to be fought.

Invasion Not Imminent

Washington dispatches indi-

cated there was no probability of

an imminent invasion. The first

army division being redeployed

from Europe isn't expected to

reach the Pacific until about De-

cember 1. Premier Soong pre-

dicted today the war will about be

over by that time. But American

commanders, who are planning

on a conquest of north China and

Manchuria, figure it will last un-

til next year.

General Kuo said the 1,000,000

Japanese combat troops in China

and Manchuria are concentrated

in the north and at central nerve

centers where they will put up

suitcase stands.

He said the American air block-

ade, already reaching into the

Yellow sea, coupled with the

presence of Allied fleets around

Japan, would prevent any plan-

ing of going to the defense

of their homeland.

Nippon Unrest Growing.

A Tokyo radio commentator as-

serted Adm. Halsey's Allied naval

forces had been "completely frus-

trated" in its attempt to size up

Japan's defensive strength and

may have withdrawn after a ten-

day air and naval bombardment.
