The greenery banked fireplace formed the improvised altar for the wedding service. The mantel was artistically decorated with an arrangement of white gladioli, white larkspur and Marconi daisies forming a large wheel with dainty sprays of pale pink larkspur forming the spokes of the bouquet. The floral arrangement was flanked by tall white candles in silver candelabra with the decorations being reflected in a huge delicately tinted pink mirror over the mantel.
