## News of 4-H CLUBS

All 4-H club members in Douglas county will be completing their third year of 4-H work this year. The first year 4-H pin, Mr. Hans T. Hansen, owner and manager of Hansen Motor company, will sponsor the awarding of these pins. Up to the present time club members have been awarded only first and five-year pins. Four-H club members are eligible to receive pins when they have completed one, three, five and ten years of club work. First year pins are provided by the State Department of Agriculture. Five-year pins are furnished by the Roseburg branch of the U. S. National bank of Portland to Douglas county boys and girls. Ten-year pins are provided by state 4-H people, and now with Mr. Hansen sponsoring the three-year pin program, Douglas county boys and girls will be able to receive all four of these pins. Three-year pins will be provided only to those who will be completing their third year's work this year.

The annual Willamette Valley livestock and crops tour for boys enrolled in livestock and crops projects will be held August 6 and 7. This tour gives the boys instruction in fitting and showing livestock, best methods to use in selecting stock through livestock judging, and general livestock practices. In the crops division, instruction will be given on seeding and maintenance of irrigated pastures, vegetable seed production, growing of home gardens, weed control, corn production, lotus and alfalfa plantings, and plant identification and judging.

Present plans are to take 20 to 25 boys from Douglas county on this tour. The group will leave Roseburg Sunday afternoon and visit a large modern dairy out from Eugene Sunday evening, camp Sunday night at the Benton-Lane park and drive into Corvallis Monday morning.

Thirteen girls and one boy organized a singing club at the Green school last Thursday evening. Olive Lewis was elected president for the group, Bernice Lounsbury vice president, Norma Fisher secretary and Donna Farris songleader. Mrs. Charles Insley will be leader for the group, assisted by Karna Henson as junior leader. Other members of the club are Shirley Fisher, Maxine Farris, Phyllis Barbara and Doris Jacobs, Gladys Lewis, Lois Jean Bliger, Joyce Claypool, and Wyllys Insley. ## Campfire Girls Reminded as to Fees and Stamps

All Campfire girls planning to attend the Douglas-Cooos county Campfire camp, August 6 to 12, are requested to pay the balance of their fee by Tuesday, July 24. This fee should be paid to Mrs. Lois Ann Stewart at the Douglas Creditors' association in the U. S. National bank building. Also due at the same time are two blue stamps and one red stamp from ration book No. 4. These must be turned in to Mrs. Stewart at this time in order that the food can be purchased. Girls who have not turned in their points are asked to take them to Mrs. Stewart by tomorrow. The girls' health blanks are to be filled out five days previous to departure for camp and kept by the girls to present to the nurse as they enter camp. The girls will depart from the Junior High school at 8 A. M. Monday, August 6. Registration fee covers transportation, so there will be no need to spend extra money for bus fare.

### Seed Buying Agreements Offered by AAA Boards

County AAA committees are now offering agreements to seed cleaning firms who will handle 1945 cover crop seeds purchased from producers for Commodity Credit under the 1945 seed purchase program. Closely similar to the 1944 plan, the agreement provides for purchase of Williams-ette and hairy vetch, crimson clover and common ryegrass. Purchases may be made on either of two methods. The first is by official purity and germination tests, under which full payment is made to the producer in accordance with the price schedule. The other is by official purity test only, under which 80 per cent payment is made to the producer pending outcome of official germination tests.
