SECRECY AT POTSDAM

Widespread suspicion is resulting from the secrecy which surrounds the Potsdam conference. Peoples of the world are intensely interested in the success of the Big Three meeting, realizing that it involves the problem of peace and security, for which tremendous sacrifices in blood are still being made.

Press and radio have vigorously protested exclusion of their representatives but without avail. Undoubtedly reporters have been barred from the conference upon the insistence of Stalin, who disagrees with freedom of the press as practiced in Great Britain and the United States, and who tells the Russian press what it may or may not publish.

Former Governor Charles A. Sprague, editor of The Oregon Statesman, published at Salem, does not agree with criticism of Potsdam secrecy. He says: This is a closed session of the three heads of states who are to discuss the gravest questions confronting the world at the moment.

Editor Sprague's point, we believe, would be well taken if the Potsdam conference were to be opened to the public on the scale of the United Nations conference at San Francisco, which we consider an example of how press relations of an important meeting should not be handled.

But at numerous times at important meetings, because of various conditions, the general press could not be admitted and selected representatives of leading news associations were assigned to act for the press as a whole.

But the very effectiveness of this "secret" weapon is tied up in exploitation by newspaper and radio. If the press and radio should suddenly refuse to mention the Potsdam conference, ignoring it completely as an item of news, then this propaganda weapon of secrecy would prove a "dud."
