Abandoned Tiny Baby Found in Garbage Can

TACOMA, Wash., July 25—(AP)—A woman alleged to have abandoned a newly-born, six-pound, 15-ounce baby girl in a garbage can yesterday and her Army husband were to meet today to plan the baby's future.

Wrapped in newspapers, the baby was found about nine hours later by garbage men who heard its wails. The mother, Mrs. William Pelesky, 24, was under technical arrest at the hospital. She had come here from Walla Walla, where she worked and was visiting a brother-in-law. Her husband, on furlough, is to report to Fort Lewis next week.

Oil Fire at Interstate Plant Quickly Put Out

dairy herds and that the number of large producers has been greatly reduced. Dairies, at the same time, have lost experienced helpers, and are paying salaries of \$200 per month to inexperienced workers, as compared with pre-war salaries of \$150 to \$175 to experienced men.

The two dairy firms, reciting the fact that three of the five distributors operating prior to the war have been forced out of business, declare that they can no longer continue under existing conditions and will be forced to close unless price increases are granted.

Mr. Sullivan stated that if closure is necessitated, it is the plan of the two dairies to accept such milk as can be obtained in the immediate vicinity of Roseburg. Pasteurization of a sufficient amount to provide for children, the Veterans facility and Mercy hospital will be maintained, but no deliveries will be made.

Africa" to Mussolini were considered in 1940 in an effort to keep Italy at peace.

"The true cause of our defeat," Daladier said, "resulted from demoralization of the army and the old conception of the inviolability of the Ardennes"—the mountainous gap of Belgium and northeast France through which the Germans burst French lines in 1940 and pushed back the Americans last December.

He said the defeat also was due to military "incapacity" and activities of the fifth column.

Slams Chair in Anger
Daladier at one point picked up a chair and slammed it to the floor as his face flushed with anger. He was recounting the story of the Riom trials in which the Vichy regime tried unsuccessfully to pin the blame for the French collapse on him, former Premier Reynaud and Blum, and Gen. Maurice Gamelin.

He said he had learned that without having been tried or condemned, he had been sentenced to life imprisonment. He recalled that the former attorney general, Cassagnau, had refused to prosecute the case at Riom and at this point he slammed the chair to the floor.

As Daladier spoke, he shook his fist. His voice frequently rose to a shout.

Firing On Allies Cited

Daladier told of the voyage of French officials aboard a liner bound for North Africa and denied that they were "fugitives or cowards," saying they did all possible to organize resistance in
